BUBONIC PLAGUE'S RAVAGES

**King Edward Writes a Message of Sym-
pathy to His Indian Subjects.**

LONDON, Aug. 29.—The bubonic
plague in India, statistics of which
have from time to time been printed,
has reached a pitch that although the
most extreme efforts have been
made to cope with the disease King
Edward has written to the Viceroy a
letter which is made public today. It
says:—

"My Dear Viceroy:—I have followed
with anxious interest the later course
of that epidemic by which India, for
eleven years past has been so sorely
afflicted. The welfare of my Indian
subjects must ever be to me an object
of high concern, and I am deeply
moved when I think of the misery
that has been borne with such silent
patience in all those stricken homes.
I am well aware how unremitting
have been the efforts of your Excel-
lency's predecessors and yourself to
make to the cause of the pestilence
and mitigate its effects.

It is my earnest hope and prayer
that the further measures now being
prepared by your Excellency in con-
sultation with zealous and able offi-
cers may be crowned with merciful
success. I desire also that you com-
municate this expression of my heartfelt
sympathy to my Indian subjects. Be-
lieve me, sincerely yours,
EDWARD, R. I.

The figures of the plague mortality,
as given in the latest blue book, are
appalling. From 23,800 deaths in 1906,
the deaths had grown in 1904 to 114,8-
800. In 1905 there was a decrease to
1,068,100, but the present year, it is
feared, will show record proportions.
In the first three and a half months of
1907 there were 485,000 deaths recorded.
The total recorded deaths from 1899 to
1905 were 4,177,200.

court.
