Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$200 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$200 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

WILL IMPORT YANKEE COAL

SYDNEY, N. S., July 13.—As a result of the strike in the Cape Breton coal fields the first order for American coal has been placed, and more will likely follow. The steamer Fritzo of the Dominion Coal Company's steamers sailed last night for Philadelphia under charter of the Dominion Iron and Steel Co. and will bring a cargo of American coal to Sydney. This precaution is taken in case that the Dominion Coal Co. is unable to supply sufficient coal to keep the steel plant in operation.

HALIFAX, July 13.—In anticipation of a shortage of coal on account of the strike in Cape Breton, Halifax coal dealers have started to Sydney. The steamer Wladimir Swain has arrived here from Swansea with 1,000 tons of Welsh coal.

LEFT HALF ESTATE

TO STARVING CATS

DUBLIN, July 13.—The late Miss Alice Mary Swift, of Exford Mansions, gave practical proof of her fondness for animals, and more particularly cats, in her will, which has just been admitted to probate.

About \$2,500, or more than one-half of the entire estate, is left to various homes for forsaken and starving cats. The chief bequest is one of \$20,000 in Consols to the Dublin Home for Forsaken and Starving Cats, for maintenance of the home and for the special chloroform chamber where they may be painlessly put to death. Miss Swift's opposition to vivisection is expressed in a clause which states that should any of the cats be used for vivisection or anatomical purposes, then the \$20,000 bequest is to be void.

The estate directed her executors to provide for the maintenance of her horse Cairo during his life. She left \$500 to the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals and \$500 to the chief of the Irish constabulary, to be distributed in grants of \$10 each to persons prosecuting any one for cruelty to a cat or cats.

Then there is a legacy of \$300 to the Rev. L. Lewis for his work in the rescue of cats in East London, and four bequests of \$250 each and one of \$10 to cats' homes in various parts of the country.

FATAL DIVE FOR A WAGER.

LONDON, July 13.—At the inquest yesterday on Thomas J. McKinlay, whose body was found in the Thames at Staines, it was stated that he had wagered he would dive off the bridge.

RICH FIND OF GOLD IN KENT

MONCTON, N. B., July 13.—There is much excitement at Notre Dame, Kent County, and vicinity over a reported gold discovery recently. It is stated that rich gold quartz was found on the bank of the creek at St. Anthony's Settlement, a short distance from St. Anthony. Both sides are believed to be on the same vein.

Samples Sent

Samples of ore were sent to New York, and the report received a day or two ago shows the quartz assayed at two hundred and twenty dollars to the ton. A man named Goggin is said to be at the head of the party making the find, and a mining lease has been taken out from the crown land office, Fredericton. It is proposed to organize a company for development of the property.

Walter Steeves, car inspector, with Corbett and Flossch, on the G. T. P. construction, sustained injuries by falling beneath a gravel train near Salisbury at noon today, which resulted in his death a few hours later. The young man attempted to board the engine as the train was moving. He missed his footing and fell under the wheels, which passed over both arms and one leg, crushing them badly. A brother of the young man saw him fall and at once signalled to stop the train, but it was too late to avert the catastrophe. The accident occurred just as the ballast train started immediately after dinner. Following the usual custom of boarding the engine, something he had done, hundreds of times before, Steeves attempted to get on the locomotive, but slipped and fell to his death. He was brought to Moncton on the engine as quickly as possible and taken to the hospital, but passed away shortly after seven this evening. Deceased was thirty years of age and had been married about four months. He was a son of Gilbert Steeves, Steeves Mountain, and had been in the employ of Corbett and Flossch since construction work started. The sad accident was a terrible shock to deceased's young wife, who is prostrated with grief, the remains will be taken to Boundary Creek tomorrow for burial. Besides his wife and parents, deceased is survived by two brothers and four sisters. Corbett & Flossch is inquiring into the circumstances of the young man's death.

BODIES ON WAY TO ST. STEPHEN FOR INTERMENT

MONTEAL, July 13.—The bodies of three Canadians who were murdered in South Dakota were brought in by train on the Bonaventure station today sent to the Canadian Express Company at Windsor station for transportation to St. Stephen, N. B., for interment at that place.

They were the bodies of James Christie, aged 37, a grain buyer, who of late years had been living at Rudolph, Aberdeen, South Dakota; his wife, Samantha, Christie, aged 30, and his daughter, Mildred, Christie, aged 18. The bodies were accompanied by certificates from the health authorities in South Dakota stating that the two women had been murdered, the cause of death being gunshot wounds, while the man had been murdered by having his skull crushed.

Mr. Doyle, diver, who met with a mishap some few days ago, is well and Mr. and Mrs. Christie and their daughter Mildred, as well as a farmhand, were murdered by a tramp whose name is not yet known. It is supposed that the murders were the result of an attempt to get a large sum of money supposed to have been in the Christie home.

Mr. Christie, who was also a grain buyer and one of the most prosperous farmers in the Northwest, was milking a cow when the unknown person struck him from behind, crushing in his skull. The murderer hurried to the house, and finding Mrs. Christie and her daughter and the farmhand boy, who was visiting at the home, began firing upon them. The two women and the boy fell dead.

It is supposed that the man or men who committed the crime were acquainted with the Christie family, for few people knew that Mr. Christie kept large sums of money in the house. It is believed he had several thousand dollars in his home at the time of the murder.

The entire countryside was wrought up. Bands of farmers were immediately organized and search for the murderers was begun.

A man named Emil Victor was arrested in Northville, twenty miles south of the scene of the murder, and taken to Aberdeen charged with the crime.
