

SHOOTING ACCIDENT IN KENT COUNTY
Sixteen-Year-Old Son of Sheriff Johnson Shot Himself Through Hand—Sheriff Was Away at Time.

Richibucto, Sept. 24.—Alphonse Johnson, sixteen-year-old son of Sheriff Johnson, accidentally shot himself through the hand on Thursday afternoon while shooting snipe on the Richibucto shore. Dr. Mersereau is attending him and hopes to save the hand. Sheriff Johnson was in Moncton at the time, having taken his daughter to the hospital for an operation.

SHIPWRECKED CREW ARRIVE AT HALIFAX
Joseph Devlin of Dalhousie, One Member of Crew of Harvest Queen, Abandoned at Sea.

Halifax, Sept. 24.—Christmas of Cape Breton, Joseph Devlin, of Dalhousie, N. B., and John Joe, the three members of the crew of the Harvest Queen, the waterlogged full rigged ship Harvest Queen, which was abandoned at sea on August 31st, and set on fire were brought in port yesterday on the Allan line steamer from Liverpool. The ship Harvest Queen was owned and captained by E. A. Forsyth of Windsor, N. S.

The Harvest Queen was twenty years old and was considered perfectly seaworthy. She left Dartmouth, N. B., laden with lumber August 12th, bound to Buenos Ayres. On Monday 24th the ship began to leak badly and the crew were at once set to work the pumps. But so fast did the water pour in that the pumps were of little avail. Besides having her hold packed with lumber she had a quantity on her decks which made the work of keeping the ship afloat all the more difficult.

Finally, Captain Forsyth decided to have the heavy deck load thrown overboard, which was done. From August 24 until 11 inst. the ship floated helplessly upon the water. During the last few days that she floated about the water began to force the hatches of the decks open. The pumps were also out of commission, and the only hope the Captain and crew had of saving their lives was to attract some steamer.

Signals of distress were then run to the top mast, but an Italian steamer that was then passing did not recognize them. It was not until the ship had drifted nearly 1500 miles that she was sighted. She was then in the Gulf of Mexico, where the members of the crew were taken off the sinking ship by the captain of the steamer Koening Luise, a German liner from New York bound to Naples and Genoa. The crew were taken to Gibraltar, the passage lasting five days. A few members of the crew remained there while others went to London and Liverpool. Captain Forsyth went to New York, where he took passage for Windsor, coming by the way of Halifax.

The three members of the crew who arrived here will engage as seamen at this port.

ENGLISH POLITICIANS IN WESTERN CANADA
C. S. Buxton, Son of President of Board of Trade, Arrives at Winnipeg—H. Vivian, M. P., a Visitor.

Winnipeg, Sept. 24.—Two young Englishmen, who have come to Canada partly for the pleasure of the trip and to see the country, for the first time, but who are chiefly interested in studying conditions from the standpoint of the part Canada is to play in the politics of the Empire, arrived in the city yesterday and are registered at the Royal Alexandra.

C. S. Buxton, who is the defeated Liberal candidate for South-East Suffolk (Woodbridge) at the last elections, is a son of the Right Hon. Sydney Charles Buxton, former postmaster-general and now president of the board of trade. He is accompanied by A. H. Villiers, of London, son of the British minister to Portugal. They will spend a day or two in the city, and proceed by easy stages to the Pacific coast, visiting all the larger towns en route. Both are consistent Liberals, and free traders, and they are much interested in ascertaining Canadian feeling on the tariff reform proposals of the Unionists as they might apply to Canada.

Henry Vivian, M. P. for Birkenhead, who has been visiting the west, will arrive in Winnipeg on his return journey the first week in October, and during his three days' stay in the city will deliver three addresses. On the evening of October 4 he will speak in Manitoba Hall under the auspices of the Free Trade League. On the afternoon of October 5 he will be the guest of the Women's Canadian Club and will deliver an address. On the evening of October 6 he will address the trade unions of the city in Trades Hall. The following evening he is due to address a public meeting at Fort William.
