Montreal, April 7.—It is rumored here that when the financial reorganization of the Canadian Northern Railway Company is consummated the firm of Lazard Freres and Co. will be a partner with Sir Wm. McKenzie and Sir Donald Mann in their transcontinental enterprise.

War Was Near.—There would have been a European conflagration but for the agreement reached by the powers regarding the frontiers of the future State of Albania, according to the opinion by Sir Edward Grey the British foreign secretary in the House of Commons this afternoon.

Report Denied.—London, April 7.—The Home Office denies that Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, now serving a three years prison term is being forcibly fed or that she is in a state of collapse.

Service Restored.—Buffalo, April 7.—Following a complete tie-up of over seven hours, the International railway today restored a partial service to the principal city and interurban lines. A determined effort will be made to break the strike.

Fatal Train Wreck.—Budapest, Hungary, April 7.—Thirty-three passengers and redcoat men are reported to have been killed and seventy others injured in a head-on collision between an express passenger train and a freight train near Karlsstadt, Croatia, last night.

Lineman Killed.—Sydney, N. S., April 7.—Richard Peters, a lineman in the employ of the Western Union Telegraph Company, was killed this morning by coming in contact with a power circuit wire carrying 2,200 volts.

NEW CABLE TO P. E. ISLAND.

(Railway and Marine World.)
An additional cable is being laid to connect Prince Edward Island with New Brunswick at an approximate cost of \$45,000. The rate of 30c. for 5 words for night letters has been extended to include all offices on the island.

The telegraph system is operated by the Western Union Telegraph Company under a lease for 99 years from 1913. The property taken over consisted of 317.5 miles of land in P. E. I., about 9 miles of cable between Cape Traverse and Cape Tormentine, and about 35 miles of land lines between Cape Tormentine and Sackville, N. B., and there are 28 telegraph offices.

COAL OUTPUT AT SPRINGHILL REDUCED.

Amherst, April 7.—The output of the Springhill mine is not up to the standard, owing to the fact that the area that is now being worked is of a decidedly limited nature. As is well known, two fires broke out in these mines, and the fire districts are completely shut off from the rest of the workings, and no attempts to work them have been made for some time.

This has led the company to reduce their working staff, and thus the output has suffered considerably. There has been some talk from time to time of opening a new slope, but nothing definite is known with regard to the plans of the company for the future.
