EARL TURNER
WRITES HOME
FROM TRENCHES

Parcels from home greatly
appreciated by soldiers on
firing line.

Hardland, Nov. 22.—Mrs. L. H. Turn-
er of St. John has received a letter
from her son Earl, who is with the
56th Battalion in France, in the
course of his letter he says: "For
dinner today we had beefsteak, fried
potatoes, bread, jam and coffee; pretty
good for a soldier, don't you think?"
"We do our own cooking, six of
us together, and we fix up some great
old beds, but I tell you what, I would
like to be home where I could get a
good feed of fried chicken. We are
billed in a barn now and we have
lots of straw to sleep on, so we have
a pretty good bed. We are out of the
trenches now for a six days' rest and
we need it."

"We had a hot old time of it last
time we were in. I guess the people
of St. John will find out that the old
56th is more than a moving picture
battalion after what they did the other
day. I got the box of candy,
tobacco, soap and towel the night we
went in, but I didn't open them till I
got in my 'dugout' that night and I
can tell you that candy and tobacco
was some treat. I didn't get a chance
to use the towel and soap until we
came out of the trenches as water is
so scarce we cannot use any of it for
washing."

Premier, without making a definite
promise, was disposed to concede the
justice of the claims and promised
careful consideration.

PEACE RUMORS
STILL PERSIST

Conference of German
Chancellor and Cardinal
of Cologne, at Zurich, re-
garded as significant.

Zurich, Switzerland, Nov. 24, via
London.—Reports of a movement for
peace were revived today by a con-
ference here of Prince Von Buelow,
former German chancellor, with the
Cardinal Archbishop of Cologne and
Dr. Von Muehlberg, Prussian minis-
ter to the Vatican. Prince Von Bue-
low, whose presence in Switzerland
for several weeks has given rise to
various peace rumors, arrived in
Zurich from Lucern this morning.
The conference is regarded as of
great importance, in view of the fact
that the cardinal is on his way to
Rome to attend the forthcoming con-
clave of the College of Cardinals.

A Rome despatch of November 17
said Cardinal Von Hartmann was
expected to arrive, and that he was
the bearer of important communications.
It was believed his expected visit
might be an indication of a definite
peace movement.

ERNEST FENETY
WELCOMED BACK
TO CAPITAL

Given grand reception in
Fredericton last night—
Meeting at Armory.

Fredericton, Nov. 24.—Corporal Er-
nest Fenety of 10th Battalion, was
given a rousing reception on his re-
turn to Fredericton tonight from the
battlegrounds of Flanders. He was met
at C. P. R. station by a crowd of
thousands of people and driven to the
armory in a barouche accompanied by
Mayor Mitchell, Major Percy A. Guthrie
and members of his family. An-
other barouche contained Ptes. Mar-
key, Jones and King, recently return-
ed from front.

Mayor Mitchell, Major Guthrie and
other returned heroes all made spee-
ches, welcoming Corp. Fenety back to
his home again and he expressed his
appreciation of reception which he
had been given. Major Guthrie, who
was commanding officer of 10th Bat-
talion, paid a fine tribute to Corp.
Fenety's gallantry on the field, de-
claring that there was no more cou-
rageous or conscientious member of
his battalion than the young man who
was being welcomed home.

London, Nov. 23.—(Gazette Cable)—
A new hospital is being established at
Ramsgate by the Canadian Medical
Service, where special treatment will
be given to men who have been gassed
and also to nerve cases. It is found
that gas cases are peculiarly tedious in
recovery, and it is sometimes very dif-
ficult to tell whether or not the pa-
tient is a milliner.

The Canadian hospital at Paris, un-
der Lieut. Col. Mignault, is making
progress and will be opened shortly.

NOT COMING TO USE MOVIES
ARRANGE LOAN
TO ADVERTISE
FRENCH LOAN

Visit of Belgian minister
to New York merely to
inspect carrying out of
contracts for War Sup-
plies.

London, Nov. 24.—The Belgian lega-
tion gave out the following today:
"According to a statement in the
Belgische Dagblad, published in the
Hague, the Belgian ministers of fi-
nance and justice are leaving for Am-
erica with the object of contracting
a loan in the United States.

"This statement is incorrect. The
Belgian minister of finance is going
over with the object not of arranging
a loan but merely to inspect the car-
rying out of contracts connected with
supplies for the Belgian army."

Paris, Nov. 4.—The screens in every
moving picture theatre in France to-
morrow will present a series of of-
ficial films concerning the great war loan
to which subscriptions open on that
day. Minister of Finance Ribot is thus
applying, for the first time, to national
ends what is defined at the ministry of
finance as one of the quickest means
for the diffusion of ideas. It will take
ten pictures, prepared by notable ar-
tists, to announce each important fact
concerning the loan.
