Around the City

First Tourists.

It was decided to have the county secretary prepare three bills if the legislature would not pass the bill as it is.

St. John Market.
Quotations given yesterday show that during the past seven days there has been a drop of seven cents in sugar; an advance of 30 cents per sack in salt; a drop of 60 cents per barrel in Ontario flour; an increase in codfish; a jump of 50 cents per crate in California oranges. There were no changes in other articles.

Brings Results.
Following The Standard's frank statement of conditions obtaining in the quarters of the Special Service Company on the West Side, Lieut. Col. Powell and Capt. Wilson, M. O., made an inspection yesterday morning and steps were at once taken to improve matters. It is also understood that an order was issued for new underwear for the men and this will be supplied to them immediately.

The Fish Market.
The run of fish has been good this week and the market is well stocked. Shad is coming in a little better and is selling for 50c. to 75c. each. A few salmon have been seen on the market but they are still scarce. The fish dealers are expecting mackerel to make its appearance soon. Prices for the week are as follows: Haddock and cod, 14c. pound; flounder, 15c. a pound; gaspereaux, 35c. a dozen; kipper, 4c. each; smoked gaspereaux, 3c. each; clams, 25c. quart; oysters, 50c. quart; lobsters, 10c. to 50c. each.

Anniversary of Serious Fire.
Today is the 45th anniversary of a serious fire which destroyed many buildings off Pond street on the site where at present the flour sheds are situated. While fighting this fire a wall fell and one man was killed and several badly injured. One of the injured was William A. Smith, a city marshal, and speaking of the occurrence yesterday he said that when the wall fell Robert Greer of Numbeg two company was killed; Samuel Dunlop, district engineer of number three company and John Jackson, captain of the Hook and Ladder Company were badly injured, while Marshal Smith himself had both legs broken, a broken collar bone and a dislocated shoulder, and it was necessary for him to remain in the hospital four months. Mr. Smith said that he never would forget that fire on Sunday evening, May 24th, 1874.

Instructive Lecture at Y. M. C. I.
The auditorium of the Y. M. C. I. was filled to capacity last night to hear Rt. Rev. Monsignor Barnes deliver his address on "Catholic Education." Dr. Broderick acted as chairman, and seated on the platform were Bishop LeBlanc and several of the local clergy. In his address Monsignor Barnes made an eloquent plea for more specialized education in the schools and universities, as he contended the purpose of the school was not to teach the child a lot of subjects which were of no use in adult life, but to give to the student the things which would be of assistance in the battle of life. True education consisted in teaching the pupil to make a better use of the mind which God had given and all studies should be based on the need of the individual. A hearty vote of thanks was extended to the speaker for his very interesting address.

RETURNED SOLDIER ARRESTED
HERE ON CHARGE OF BIGAMY

Chester C. Trenholme Taken Into Custody Last Night—Prisoner Has Two Wives—One Engaged in Overseas War Work for Y. M. C. A., and Other Still Lives in Moncton—"Wife No. 1" Learning of Second Marriage Returned to Canada and Caused Arrest.

Chester C. Trenholme, a returned soldier, was arrested on King street about eleven o'clock last night by Chief of Police Rideout of Moncton and locked up at police headquarters with the serious charge of bigamy booked against him. The chief was accompanied by Detectives Briggs and Duncan when the arrest was made.

Before being taken into custody Chief Rideout gave the usual warning to Trenholme to the effect that anything he might say would be used against him and then when the chief said he was going to place him under arrest for bigamy the prisoner said he had "been expecting that to happen for some time."

Today being a holiday and no session of the court, Trenholme will be held at headquarters until Friday morning when the Moncton chief can get his warrant backed by Magistrate Ritchie. The prisoner will then be taken to the railway town.

Chief Rideout leaves for Fredericton this morning to spend the holiday. Has At Least Two Wives.

It is alleged that Trenholme has at least two wives, and according to number one, it was more than ten years ago that she was married to him. She gives her name as Mrs. May C. Trenholme. At the time of her marriage she was a resident of Bellefleur Creek, Kings county, some miles back of Norton. With her husband she moved to the United States, where they lived for some time together.

Trenholme left his wife and came back to New Brunswick about ten years ago. When he returned he was married in Amherst, N. S., to Margaret Wall. With wife number two he resided in Moncton and three children were born. While they resided there Trenholme was regarded as a hard working man. He was engineer on the Moncton city steam roller when he enlisted with a New Brunswick battalion and went overseas.

First Wife Takes Up War Service.
Mrs. May C. Trenholme, wife number one, had not learned much about her husband as she remained in the states from the time he left her, but, being a true Canadian, when the war broke out she felt she should do something for her country.

While in Moncton Trenholme and family resided on McDougall Avenue. He is a native of Melrose, Westmorland county, and is between forty-five and fifty years of age. His second wife and family are still in Moncton.

Trenholme arrived in St. John from England a few months ago and was housed in the discharge depot for a time before obtaining his discharge.

Charles Robinson, secretary of the Returned Soldiers' Commission, interested himself in obtaining a position for the returned soldier who was placed in charge of one of the city steam rollers and was receiving good wages.

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something for her country and, leaving the United States, she sailed for London, and there engaged in the Y. M. C. A. military work. Claiming in her uniform, with its brass buttons, Mrs. Trenholme, number one, worked faithfully, and while thus engaged was informed that her husband had married again.

This was more than six months ago, and learning that her husband had been residing in Moncton, she wrote to Chief of Police Rideout for information. She received an answer to the effect that her suspicions were true, and her husband had been married to Margaret Wall, had been residing in Moncton, and that he had gone overseas with a battalion.

Saw "Hubby" in London.
Private Trenholme had been serving his country overseas for some months when he was ordered back to Canada. While he was taking in the sights of London his wife, number one, saw him and learned that he was on his way back to New Brunswick.

She tried for some months to obtain a furlough and this was only granted a few weeks ago. She arrived in Halifax on Tuesday morning and proceeded to Moncton and the official in the latter place were surprised when the woman, wearing her uniform, called and swore out a warrant for the arrest of Chester C. Trenholme on the charge of bigamy.

Chief Rideout lost no time after receiving the warrant in coming to St. John, knowing that the man wanted was employed here. With the two local detectives, Trenholme was found in the doorway of the Military Discharge Depot in the Bank of Montreal building on King street and was placed under arrest.

Fifteen men added new life yesterday to the recruiting situation in this city. This is the best day St. John has experienced for months and it looks as though the young men of the province are not going to wait until they are drafted overseas. The Canadian Engineers secured five of the total. These will be sent to St. John, Quebec, in the next draft, which is soon to leave.

The Forestry Unit also figured prominently in the day's work and three more men were attested for Major Hamilton's unit. At present the overseas units seem to be the most popular with the eligibles, but it is the opinion of military men, that the older men will soon realize their duty and enlist in the home defence units.

No Orders Yet to Recruit.
The military authorities have received instructions that recruiting on the other side of the border is not permissible as yet, and any units having men seeking British subjects for enlistment in the United States are ordered to recall them immediately. Arrangements are being made with the United States government for this privilege, but they have not been completed.

Back From France.
Pte. John J. Flood of 57 Celebration street, arrived home yesterday morning from the front after serving for several months with the Canadian forces in France. Since his departure from home with the 115th Battalion he has gone through some hazardous experiences. That he is able to speak today is due to the skill of a famous surgeon.

Pte. James Pitt.
Much to the surprise of his family and relatives, Private James Pitt, son of James H. Pitt, ex-park policeman, arrived home from the front yesterday after an absence of about one year. Private Pitt went overseas with the 115th Battalion under Lieut. Colonel Wedderburn. He was a member of the first draft taken from that unit to reinforce a battalion at the front, and he was the first member of Col. Wedderburn's warriors to have been wounded.

Pte. Harold Fish.
Another returned soldier to reach the city yesterday morning was Pte. Harold Fish, a member of the first contingent of Pte. Fish experienced keen disappointment on his first time home in almost three years. His mother had moved to Toronto and as the soldier is back for only a short time he hopes to see her before the call of duty again takes him away. Pte. Fish was among the first to enlist and has been doing his bit well ever since. He was confined to hospital for six months out of the three years as a result of an accident with his horse.
