Murphy Big Winner At Charter Oak

Sends Arron Guy to First Money in Acorn Purse for 3-Year Olds—Dope Upset in 2.14.

Hartford, Conn., Sept. 8.—Tommy Murphy was the big winner of the third day of the Grand Circuit, mooning at Charter Oak Park today, driving three of his four entries in the four events to first money and getting fourth money with the other.

Murphy drove John Henry to a win in the 204 pace, Arron Guy to first money in the Acorn Purse for three-year-old trotters, and Dope to a three-beat victory in the 218 trot, winning the last two heats after Dope had broken that because of Dope's bad break.

Paul Journee, Who Was Defeated, Once Sparring Partner for Georges Carpentier

Deauville, France, Sept. 8.—Bombardier Wells, the English heavy-weight fighter, last night defeated Paul Journee, a French heavy-weight, in the sixteenth round of a contest held here, Journee, who once was sparring partner for Georges Carpentier, has been knocked out twice this year—in March in London by Wells in the thirteenth round, and in May in the same city by Frank Moran, Philadelphia, in two rounds.

Dover, England, Sept. 8.—Henry Sullivan, of Lowell, Mass., tonight started another attempt to swim the English Channel to the French Coast. He entered the water at 7:45 o'clock. The water was cold, but the sea was smooth.

At the end of two hours it was reported that Sullivan had gone six miles.

Sullivan last month made an attempt to cross the Channel from Dover to Calais, but was forced to give up when within three miles of his goal on account of the rough seas.

NATIONAL AND AMERICAN LEAGUES' PENNANT RACES

Tightened up Another Notch Yesterday—Brooklyn's Victory Put Them Tie With Cincinnati in Games—The Giants Gained in Points—Real Test Next Week—Bodie Fractured Ankle—Yesterday's Results.

New York, Sept. 8.—The pennant races in the National and American Leagues tightened up another notch as a result of today's games. In the senior circuit, the Cincinnati Reds, who are setting the pace, were idle, while Brooklyn in second place, defeated Philadelphia, and New York in third place, won two games from Boston. The Brooklyn victory put them tie with Cincinnati so far as games are concerned, but the Reds have a lead of four percentage points. The Giants double victory over the Cincinnati in games the Giants are one and one-half behind Cincinnati and Brooklyn.

Chicago Gains.
Cleveland and New York were not scheduled today in the American League, while Chicago defeated St. Louis, and thereby gained three points. The New York team will start under a decided disadvantage of an accident to Bodie who fractured his right ankle in an exhibition game at Pittsburgh today and because the Yank owners have decided not to use Pitcher C. B. Mays in the Cleveland series.
