

RUSSIA AND CHINA REACH AN AGREEMENT

Contract Signed for Operation of Chinese Railroad Under Joint Directorate. By ROGER AMES BURR. (Copyright, 1920, by Public Ledger). Peking, Oct. 10.—M. Raldrin, manager of the Russo-Asiatic Bank, and Yeh Kung Chao, Minister of Communications, have signed a contract based on the provisions of the Chinese-Russian agreement of 1898 and providing for joint operation of the Chinese Eastern Railway on a strictly commercial basis and with the greatest possible Chinese participation in the direction of the line. The reorganized railway will have five directors, nominated by the Chinese and five appointed by the Russians, with alternating seats of railway traffic rolling stock, accounts and construction are to be headed by Russian chiefs and Chinese assistants. The bank guarantees that it itself is a Russian limited company not connected with any Russian political party, and declares expressly that only Russian and Chinese have an interest in the railway. The bank pledges to issue to the Chinese Government railway bonds of the value of 10,000,000 to 12,000,000 taels, 5,000,000 being the amount not paid to China on the completion of the railway, according to the Chinese-Russian agreement of 1898; the balance covers accrued interest at 6 per cent. The exact interest is undetermined, owing to a difference of opinions as to the year the line was completed, China claiming 1903 and the bank 1907. As far as the bank is concerned, China is entitled to take over the political sovereignty of the railway zone formerly assumed by Russia. A presidential mandate announcing this is now in the process of drafting.

35,000,000 LIVES COST OF WORLD WAR

France Lost Seven Per Cent. of Her Total Population.

(Copyright, 1920, by Public Ledger). Paris Oct. 10.—The cost of the world war to the human race is estimated at 35,000,000 lives, according to the figures of the Danish statistician, Loening. The figures, published here today with comment on the losses, equal the present population of France. Of the total living counts 10,000,000 killed in action or died from wounds, 2,900,000 from the increase in mortality among the civil populations during the war, but the largest group estimated is the loss of 20,000,000 due to abnormal decrease in the birth rate. Concerning France, in particular, whose losses stand next in order after Austria, Hungary, Poland, the Balkans and Russia, the total population, according to Doring, diminished seven per cent. Franchises between the ages of 20 and 44, decreased at the rate of 20 per cent, which contributed to the present day ratio of 126 women to every 100 men. While the losses in eastern Europe were proportionately greater than France, they were not all military deaths, but the great majority were due to famine, epidemics and especially typhus, which is ravaging many regions.



REDS DEPORT GIRLS FROM SOUTH RUSSIA

Thousands of Women Seized and Sent to Chinese Camps on the Western Front. (Copyright, 1920, by Public Ledger). St. Petersburg, Oct. 10.—Thousands of young women of the educated classes have been deported by the Bolshevik authorities from southern Russia and placed at the disposal of the Soviet Chinese troops on the Polish front, according to statements made by two Russian refugees who escaped from Odessa and have just arrived here after drifting about for several days in an open boat in the Black Sea. Several weeks ago, they declare, the Bolsheviks drew a cordon of Red troops around the city of Odessa and began systematically rounding up all "bourgeois" who were not occupied in manual labor. The cordon was drawn closer every day, and escape was almost impossible. At first, the orders sent from Moscow to arrest and deport only women not engaged in work useful to the state were carried out rigidly, but soon the Bolshevik commissaries began seizing every woman unfortunate enough to take their fancy. Terrible Scenes Presented. Terrible scenes were presented when wives were torn from their husbands, and young girls, not out of their teens, brutally wrested from their parents. The Soviet authorities explained they were forced to take these measures because the Chinese troops had threatened that otherwise they would stop fighting. Incredible as these Red atrocities may seem, it is every reason to believe they are true, for statements made by the two refugees, man and wife, have been checked carefully with information from other sources and found to be accurate. Revoltis continually are taking place in Odessa, but they are suppressed cruelly and are invariably followed by numerous executions. The most recent revolt was fomented by the German colony, which had secreted stores of arms and ammunition in a lathery-chamber. Many Bolsheviks were killed, but eventually the Reds triumphed, after receiving reinforcements.
