Committee Will Wait On Council**Will Urge City to Take Over Entire Output from Musquash and Distribute It Themselves.**

The meeting called last evening by the Hardware Clerks Association to form a citizens committee to work for municipal control and distribution of the electric current in the Province held in the Board of Trade rooms, was attended by about 150 persons and after hearing from Mr. Phillips, the engineer and contractor for the construction work at Musquash, it was decided to form such a committee. Mr. Phillips made the opinion unanimous in answer to a question from Mr. Phillips that the power was ready to turn on. He also admitted in answer to a question from another gentleman, that he was not an electrical engineer but a civil engineer and contractor.

Mr. Phillips was asked to act as chairman before introducing Mr. Phillips as representative of the Hardware Clerks on the interest they had taken in the matter and referred him to the duty of every citizen to take an intelligent and active part in arriving at the best solution of the whole question.

Mr. Phillips, the speaker of the evening, spoke around the various topics while Mr. Phillips had his signature in the St. John Globe, and claimed the figures given were demonstrated that energy could be delivered to the citizens for at least one-half what it now cost if the city were to build its own transmission plant and distribute the electricity to the people. He claimed the power plant and transmission line for about \$100,000 but if they would not be estimated the cost of a new transmission line at not over that amount.

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
