

## Newly Appointed Rector Preached

Rev. A. L. Fleming Delivered  
Two Eloquent Sermons at  
St. John's Church Sunday.

Rev. A. L. Fleming, the newly appointed rector of St. John's Church, preached two eloquent sermons Sunday which were listened to by large congregations. This evening the induction service will be held at St. John's Church at which the Lord Bishop of Fredericton will officiate, delivering the sermon.

At the Sunday morning service, before announcing his text the Rev. Mr. Fleming referred feelingly to the work of the previous rectors of the parish. All had been earnest and devoted men of God. The first, he said, had been a great pastor; the second, a great and outstanding preacher, while the last had combined with both the pastoral and preaching offices that of the soldier.

"Pray for me," he urged, "that the spirit of these men of God may fall upon me and that, guided by the Holy Spirit, I may walk worthily in their footsteps and be a true and faithful servant of Jesus Christ."

He then announced his text, reading from Dr. Moffatt's translation: "So I am an envoy for Christ, appealing by me, as it were, I entreat you on behalf of Christ."—3 Cor. 5: 20.

He said in part: "It is essential to a proper understanding of the preacher and his message, that the relationship between the Master and the servant be made clear. If the envoy is filled with the spirit of Saint Paul, he will not minimize his high privilege and responsibility from the human side, but he will ever remember that the presentation of his subject must be always second to the glory of God. The whole object of his preaching is to present Jesus Christ to men that their hearts will go out to Him in love and obedience. The preacher is merely the channel through which God speaks to the congregation, and yet it is incumbent upon him that he be a channel fit for the Master's use. He will not be ashamed of the gospel he preaches for it is the power of God unto salvation to His people, but he will be kept humble by the consciousness of his inability to do justice to so great a theme.

We stand, in this parish, with our backs to a glorious tradition, the preaching of the Evangel in the simplicity of the Apostles. Our feet are on the Eternal foundation Jesus Christ—let us see to it that we build thereon no jerry tenements of foolish speculation or passing cults and shiftings. Rather let us erect a superstructure of the gold of sacrifice to God and to man, of the silver of pure thoughts and holy adoration, and

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## Wife's Indian Spirits Ruined Home, He Says

Nevertheless Mrs. Lowe Gets  
\$35 Weekly Allowance from  
Her Actor Husband.

New York, Sept. 5.—Sybil's "husband" is described in an answer filed yesterday with the Supreme Court by Eugene F. Lowe, actor, of 354 West Fifty-first street, in a suit for separation by Mrs. Margaret Lowe. The information, however, did not deter Justice Weasner from granting to Mrs. Lowe \$35 a week alimony and \$250 counsel fees. She says her husband abandoned her four years ago and called recently at her home, threatening to kill her.

Lowe's answer pictures him as the "sneak of the household." He says he washed dishes, made beds, swept the floors and performed other household duties, while his wife idly dabbled in spiritualism. He says the spirits of "Red Feather" and "Little Flower" manifested themselves to Mrs. Lowe and became her guides or controls. One of them told her it was proper for her to be sympathetic toward the household duties, he says, and at another time advised her not to become reconciled to him.

The Lows were married on March 26, 1902. They have a son aged 17.

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## GERMAN BUTCHER IS ACCUSED OF MANY MURDERS

Girls Were Frequently Tortured Before They Were Slaughtered.

Berlin, Sept. 5.—Germany has her Jack the Ripper on a much larger scale than London some two or three decades ago. Karl Grossman, a butcher or over 50 years old, and a miserable emaciated looking individual, was arrested for the murder of a woman who had been a familiar figure near the railroad stations. The police investigation developed the fact that he has murdered more than 100 women, mostly belonging to the class referred to above. But some were cases of innocent young girls whom he had engaged as housekeepers or induced to enter his lodgings on some other pretext. Sometimes Grossman kept his victims in his rooms for weeks, often torturing them and finally butchering them. He would burn or bury their bodies or throw them into the water.

Berlin had been alarmed for the past fortnight by daily reports of parts of women's bodies found in one place in a canal here that all showed some marks of some manner of beating. Some young girls, who escaped an awful fate at the last minute by a lucky chance testified that Grossman asked her to buy "veal" from him that looked as though it had been cut from a girl's body. Since the investigation began witnesses from other parts of Germany where Grossman formerly was employed testified either by letter or in person to similar crimes that date back some years. If they remained uncovered until now it was because Grossman's victims either belonged to the class of unfortunate women or men were girls run away from home. Whenever suspicion arose Grossman disappeared completely for the time being. To the Berlin street woman he was well known as "mysterious Karl." They feared him for the horrible tales told about him but his pocketbook, always bulging with 100-mark bills, the source of which still is unknown, proved too alluring for the hungry girls.

The police believe the number of Grossman's victims may reach 150.

## Fine Record By British Red Cross

War Report Recently Issued  
Shows Public Gave 16,500,-  
000 Pounds in Cash.

London, Sept. 5.—The war report of the British Red Cross Society, which has just been issued, is a record of the greatest voluntary effort in British history.

The accounts show that the public subscribed £106,500,000 in cash and gave more than £1,775,000 in stores. The expenditure included more than \$5,000,000 for hospitals and stores, and more than \$2,000,000 for the transportation of 16,000,000 sick and wounded.

Grants to post-war schemes for after care, &c., absorbed £2,700,000, and the surplus on June, 1920 was £1,204,450.

At the time of the armistice the total staff of the Red Cross at home and abroad was 9,234. In addition there were 135,000 auxiliary helpers, 95,000 of whom were women.

Owing to the principal workers giving their services free the entire cost of administration was less than 1 1/2 per cent. of the income.

A PACKING HINT.  
Can you think of anything more discouraging than to have to unpack a trunk from top to bottom to find something that lies on the lowest layer? We have all done it enough. Try packing undervestments in an envelope of different color, and provide snap fasteners so that the envelopes may be opened out perfectly flat.
