The place where the deed was done was on the Bangor road, near the village, in front of P.O'Donnell's boarding house. Mary Keily, the young man's girl, lived in this house. There is a little hill on the road here and a grassy bank which slopes lown to the mill pond, about 50 feet distant. The body was found by a little boy who was carrying water for his mother, about half way between the road and the pond, aboul 7 o'clock on Saturday morning. Word was atonce given to the authorities and soon a large crowd collected. The appearance of the body as it lay on the grass gives one the impression that

The body was flat and straight with the face downward, and the hands neatly folded under the body, while morning frosts had crusted his upper clothing with its white breath. Traces of a bloody hand are seen where it had clutched the right leg evidently in carrying or dragging the body to its position, while on the toe of the left foot there are also traces where it had evidently been dragged through a pool of blood. Suspicion at once centered on a man named Keily, who had been heard to use threats against this young man for keeping company with his daughter. He and the daughter were both arrested and examined on Saturday. No proof of anything like guilt could be shown against her, and she was at once liberated, while he is still held in custody. A post mortem examination shows that HE WAS SHOT IN THE TEMPLE

by a pistol ball, the ball entering well up near the top on the left side cut through an artery, shattered and glanced off the skull, and came out behind the ear. At the inquest now being held the whole affair is being thoroughly sifted, and doubtless some clew to the perpetrator of the deed, strong and clear, will yet be found.
