LEAFS FOR THE MAJOR LEAGUE

American Uprising Against Ban Johnson Threatens New Circuit by Next Spring.

New York, Nov. 7.—The opponents of President Ban Johnson, of the American League—Chicago, New York and Boston—stand ready to launch a new major baseball league at a last resort in their fight against Johnson. It would get the recognition of the National League and have all sorts of money behind it.

Charles A. Comiskey, of Chicago, declared most emphatically that his team, New York and Boston, if forced to it, could get along without the other five clubs. Col. Ruppert, of New York, said: "If they (the Johnson supporters) wish to wreck baseball, then they will find us right in there among the wrecking crew. We would all deplore anything that would injure such a great game as baseball, but, big as it is, the game is too small for both me and Johnson. I intend to stick."

What They Plan.
The plans for the new league are already laid. The west would remain as it is, except that Pittsburgh, financed by Sinclair, the oil magnate, and a Federal League backer, would replace St. Louis, E. Ford, a son of the automobile mogul stands ready to buy out Detroit or put another team in there. McKinney, with all kinds of money, would step into Cleveland. J. K. L. Ross is prepared to back a team in Montreal, and Toronto has been ripe for major league baseball for some years.

That would put new owners in Detroit and Cleveland substitute Pittsburgh for St. Louis, and put Toronto and Montreal in place of Washington and Philadelphia. It would also relieve St. Louis and Philadelphia of the task of supporting two teams, unless the Johnnies also formed a new circuit which they doubtless will if the threatened smash comes, which it is freely predicted is an assured fact before spring unless ways and means are meanwhile found to oust Johnson, who is supported by Detroit, Philadelphia, Washington Cleveland and St. Louis.

NEW ONTARIO URGING ITS RIGHTS

Secession Advocated by Some Northerners

COBALT, Nov. 7.—The move to assert the rights of New Ontario, with a large portion of the north advocating secession from older Ontario as the proper means, is taking definite form. The North Bay Council and other public men held an informal conference, and this resulted in the decision to call the convention.

FORTY-FIRST YEAR

TWO PROHIBITION BILLS SECURE THIRD

Three Months After Request by Legislature Bone-Dry Referendum—Second Bill Manufacture.

HOUSE SITS ON SUNDAY

Ottawa, Nov. 10.—Parliament wiped precedent aside at midnight on Saturday and decided to continue the sittings into Sunday in order to give third reading on the federal prohibition bill, to have it ready for the Senate on Monday morning. As a matter of fact there were two liquor bills passed, the first one earlier in the day, was to prohibit the manufacture of liquor for illegal purposes. This is only a matter of form.

During the 45 minutes the House sat after midnight, two protests against the proceeding were voiced by French Canadian members. Mr. LaFortune produced the Lord's Day Act to prove that it was Sunday, and declared the action of the House to be unchristian work.

In the rush of the last day the order paper was cleared with the exception of the supply bill. This will be taken up to-day together with some minor bills from the Senate and if the Upper House disposes of the prohibition bill take place about 4 o'clock Monday afternoon.

Supplies voted during the afternoon and evening totalled over \$65,000,000. The big item was \$40,000,000 to carry out the recommendations of the soldiers' committee. The next largest item was \$20,000,000 for soldiers' land settlement.

At the morning sitting the House on a division of 57 to 33 concurred in the Senate amendment to the Grand Trunk bill providing that the award of arbitrators must not yield more than \$1,000,000 per annum to the shareholders in dividends.

New Temperance Bill.
The bill to amend the Canada Temperance Act contains no reference to the manufacture of liquor, which means that manufacture for export will be allowable and that any prohibition which is taken at the request of a province will deal with the matter of importation only.

Manufacture of liquor was dealt with in the bill passed early in the day, on guilty.

EPIDEMIC IS NOT LOSING STRENGTH

TORONTO, Nov. 10.—The smallpox epidemic had not by any means abated. It is the opinion of Dr. Hastings that physicians are not reporting all cases, but are taking advantage of the fact that in so many instances the symptoms very closely resemble chickenpox and are therefore giving their patients the benefit of the doubt as they realize the inconvenience of having a home quarantined during the illness of the patient. There may be as many as 2000 cases of smallpox in the city.

During the past 48 hours, 50 new cases of smallpox were reported at the Department of Health. One case was sent to the Isolation Hospital and the remaining 49 were quarantined in their own homes. This makes a total of 169 known cases now in the city. Twenty are in the hospital and the balance are at their homes. There are 123 homes, in which patients are being treated and 138 homes in which there are other cases or persons quarantined who were exposed to the disease. 60 persons are under quarantine.

SAND CAVED IN, ESCAPED BURIAL

Mr. Herbert Dyke Slightly Injured
What might have been a serious accident occurred on Saturday when Mr. Herbert Dyke of 146 Peter Street, was hurled about twenty feet in a cave-in of part of the gravel pit owned by his employer, Mr. Casper Brown, of Mill Street. As it is Mr. Dyke was bruised and his limbs strained, the result necessitating his remaining off duty for some time.

Mr. Dyke was engaged in loading sand when without warning the sand overhead fell on him. While he was thrown for about twenty feet he was not buried and fellow workmen were able to come to his assistance. He was soon afterwards removed to his home. While he will not be able to resume his duties for some time, no serious results are anticipated from the experience.

OPPOSITION TO MACKENZIE KING

NEWMARKET, Oct. 10.—The United Farmers of North York will try their fortune in Dominion politics. At a meeting Saturday afternoon they decided to enter a candidate in the federal arena. If Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal party, adheres to his intention of seeking election in North York, the Farmers think they can defeat him.

STEAMER IONIC AGROUND

KINGSTON, Nov. 10.—The Donnelly Wrecking Company sent a wrecking outfit to the Moreauville Canal this morning to assist the steamer Ionic which is aground.
