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but you will acquaint the king your mafter with whatever passes. And, whereas you tell me, that till you receive his orders, you will do your duty: I also tell you beforehand, that I shall not be wanting in doing mine.

I have been just informed, that the Sieur Goram, has taken the Abbé Gerard, rector of Copequit, prisoner. I know not the reasons, why such a step has been taken; but, as he is a subject of the king, my master, I desire you will send him, without loss of time, back to his country.

A ME MORIAL, containing complaints from England, and delivered to the Marquis de Puysiculx the 7th of June, 1750, by my lord Albemarle,

THE underwritten ambassador, extraordinary and plenipotentiary, from his majesty, the king of Great-Britain, has received orders from the king his master, dated Hanover, the 26th of last month, to represent to the court of France, how much he is surprised at hearing the violent proceedings of the French in America, under the authority and direction of M. de la Jonquiere, who has readily avowed them.
