GETS CONTRACT

New Market Sheds to be
Erected at Once on 1d
Site

Busy Meeting of Council—Ald. Potter
Complains re Tecumseh Park.

The tender handed in by W. H.
Carswell for the erection of the
new market was accepted by the
Council last Thursday evening.

The Building committee, of which
Ald. Jas. King is chairman, brought
in the following report:—

To His Worship the Mayor, and Ald-
ermen of the City of Chatham:
Gentlemen,—The Special Building
Committee beg to report as follows:

That W. H. Carswell's tender be
accepted for No. 4, for the con-
sideration of \$16,500, the same not to
include police cells, on condition
that he guarantees to proceed with
either of the front sections, No. 1 or
No. 2, as per tender, No. 1 \$39,617.00,
No. 2 \$30,297.00, received by Council
in regular session April 17, 1905.

If Council decide to proceed with
the work after June session of the
County Council.

James A. King,

Ald. Westman brought up the
matter of the Police Court cells. It
was unfortunate that these were not
included in the specifications. They
were omitted in all of the tenders.

Ald. Austin asked if the cells in
the present Police Court could be
utilized, but Architect Rutley, who
was present, said they were out of
date.

The tender was so high that if ac-
cepted the Council will have to ask
the people for more money before
they can finish the front part of the
building or cut the building down.

This last proposition of cutting
the building down was not commended
by any of the aldermen.

Ald. King and Westman thought
that the ratepayers along the mar-
ket should pay a fair share of the
cost of the pavements.

Ald. Austin objected to this. He
said the money was voted by the peo-
ple for the pavement and it should
be spent on pavement.

As this was a matter for after-
consideration, the report of the
Building committee was adopted.

There were present at the meeting,
Mayor Cowan and Ald. Austin, King,
Ainsworth, Potter, Westman and Ed-
mondson.

A report from the City Engineer
on the garbage lot was referred to
the Property Committee.

The Blonde Company were granted
permission to build a granolithic
walk in front of their premises.

Ald. Potter brought up the matter
of the city's rights on Tecumseh
Park. He complained that athletes
were practicing games on the Park
now, when they should not. The
Park should not be used until the 1st
of May. He had no authority to keep
them off, as the players said they
had permission from Col. Rankin.

It was arranged that before an
athletic club can play on the Park
they must get a permit from the
Chief of Police, countersigned by Col.
Rankin. This was the best arrange-
ment he could make with Col. Ran-
kin.

This arrangement was allowed to
stand for the present.

Ald. Edmondson called the atten-
tion of the Board of Works to a
bad crossing on St. Clair street, at
Amelia street.
