BAY VIEW, Nov. 6.—Fall work is pretty well done; crops all gathered in except a few potatoes. The potato crop was far below the average, and in many places a failure. Grain crops are not up to the average. Co-operative dairying in the cheese factories had a successful season. The milk is up to a good average and the price satisfactory. The better factories also had a profitable season with good prices. Shipping has begun. Oats are 100; potatoes 50; best quality dressed hogs, 105; poultry, 15c to 16c; beef, by the carcass, 95; eggs, 30c dot. There is a sale for horses at farm on \$4.35 for sheep and lambs offer at from \$4.35 for crop here was largely a failure.—W. S.

RICHMOND, Nov. 3.—We are having very weather. Plowing is well advanced. Potatoes are dug and were a poor crop. As are turnips also. Thrashing is the order of the day; all grain turned out well to the stack. Prices for all farm products are advancing. The market quotations at present are: Oats, black, 46c; white, 45c; potatoes, 50c; butter, dairy, 35c; eggs, 25c; hams and sheep are high, the former 7c over 6 lb; fat sheep, 5c a lb.—J. D. Meis.

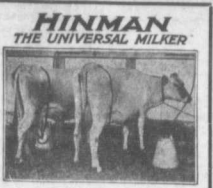
HASTINGS CO. ONT.
