Wallace & Son, Bunceton, Mo. He was bred by Messrs. J. & W. Watt, Salem, Ont., and calved in March, 1885. His sire was Abbotsburn 47312. bred at Sittyton from Red Gauntlet, and his dam was Village Blossom, also bred by Mr. Cruickshank. Young Abbotsburn was the monarch of American shows of 1890 1891. 1892 and 1893, including the Columbian Exposition.


