Enemy Failed in Their Objective, Says Eye-witness.

GAINED LITTLE

London, May 31.-An account of he recent fighting in Flanders, written by the official eye-witness with the British general staff, under date of May 28, was issued by the Press Bureau to-day. It may be summarized as follows:

Monday, May 24 witnessed a fresh development of the situation on our A violent bombardment with gas shells was started against the section of our line in this quarter, extending from a point north of Wieltje. The Germans released gas from large numbers of cylinders along the whole ine, and the gas continued to pour the south-west for some hours in reat volumes. This attempt to asphyxiate our men

The War Office made known Saturday night that the last German positions in the Bois le Pretre were captured at the point of the bayonet by soldiers of the class of 1915, who \$7.00 to \$12.00; yearlings, \$5.00 to ward with utter disregard of their \$10.50; wethers, \$7.20 to \$7.50; ewes, lives in a magnificent charge. SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominiou land in Mauitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.
