WILL RETURN TO INDEPENDENCE

Belgium Will Come Back to Her Own After the War.

Have, France, Sept. 27.—"Belgium will come back to her own, to her place in the sun, and to complete freedom and independence," said Baron Beyens, Minister of Foreign Affairs of Belgium, in the course of an authorized interview given to The Associated Press.

Baron Beyens is one of the notable figures of the present war, for up to the beginning of the war he was the Belgian Minister at Berlin and went through the crisis culminating in the immediate entry of England, France, and all Europe into the seething struggle. Then, leaving Berlin, he entered the Belgian cabinet and has since created the foreign affairs of the country, finding time also to write a book which graphically describes "the week of tragedy" in the German capital when the British and French ambassadors, and himself, made their last attempts to prevent the European conflict.

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs, where Baron Beyens was seen, is installed at Ste. Adresse, a suburb of Havre, in the Villa Hollandais, a building which was occupied in ordinary times by seashore visitors, but now bearing on the outer gate a small placard reading: "Ministère des Affaires Etrangères de Belgique." A foreigner usually suggests marble and big diplomatic rooms with ambassadors sitting among oil paintings and mahogany furnishings. But here there is nothing of the kind. It has been put up in the garden for various diplomatic and consular branches. Inside the villa there is the simplicity of a summer cottage, but everything is scrupulously well done and effective.

Baron Beyens expressed at the outset the deep sense of appreciation felt by Belgium toward the people of the United States, and, in particular, toward those who had directed the work of sending food-supplies to Belgium.

STORY OF AIR RAID ON ENGLAND

Is Told By Brother-in-law of Capt. W. Norman Andrews, of the 215th.

The following very interesting eyewitness account of a recent air raid upon the English coast is contained in a letter sent by Major Geo. Stacey to a brother-in-law of Capt. W. N. Andrews of the 215th battalion.

"On the night I was brigade field officer of this brigade, the duties being to inspect all guards of the four battalions in the brigade, the parades, camps, canteens, cook houses, etc., and responsible for the general cleanliness and efficiency of the brigade.

At 10 p.m. I received telephone orders from the divisional headquarters to prepare for air raids. Immediately the field officer, on receiving such an order, calls out each battalion guard, has issued to each man on each guard 50 rounds of ammunition, and orders each guard to stand to until such time as the 'Zep' is disposed of or the raid is called off. This we did, and at 2.10 a.m. we heard the buzz of the Zep's engines about 12,000 feet overhead, but could distinguish the uninvited visitor, but at 2.12 a.m. the coast searchlights picked her up and we could see her quite distinctly. She was out of range of our guns, and our part in the raid was to look on and pray, swear or say nothing, according to the individual temperament of the spectator. Personally, I bet myself 100 million pounds sterling that our coast guns would bring her down, but, with my usual luck, lost.

"As soon as the searchlights picked up the Zep, the aircraft guns on the coast immediately came into action and we could see quite distinctly the course of the shots and the bursting of the shrapnel all around the Zep, some short, some past her, some under and some above, and three shots apparently through her. By this time, fortunately, she had cleared the coast and was over the Channel, and consequently her bombs were falling in the water, although she had some hits, with small loss of life to us.

"Two or three water craft now came into action, and with the full power of all the searchlights focused on her, the Zep found the game too strong and made a drop of approximately 800 feet, trying to lose the searchlights, but they picked her up again immediately and she turned tail and ducked for home, apparently hit, but not crippled enough to stop her.

"We could distinctly hear the bursting of the bombs, the crack of the discharge of the guns as each shot was fired, the tearing noise of the speeding of the shrapnel and could see the course of each shot and the descent of the Zep's bombs, and enjoyed 12 minutes of excitement.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within one mile of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader's good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$20.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead pay; also 80 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his home-stand right may take a purchased home-stand in certain districts. Price \$500 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to re-duction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. BRITISH WILL PARE ANOTHER BATAUME AS

Driving Northward

pare Another Bataume As

Offensive

By Courier Leased Wire.

New York, Sept. 23.—The London correspondent of The Tribune called last night as follows: Driving northward slowly, but relentlessly, the British are making ready for another surge toward Bapaume. They are moving along lines of attack—one north of the valley and the other north of Comb seeking to pocket Bapaume as Combles was pocketed.

The battle continued without pause today. Haig's troops, in another heavy attack, won the greater part of a redoubt 500 yards north of Thiépval, overlooking the north bank of the Ancre. From this dominating position the ground that separates Haig's line from the Ancre is shelled so effectively that its quest is expected to be comparatively easy. In this action 600 prisoners were taken.

At the other end of the north front the British are now less than half a mile from La Sars, which blocks the way along the Albert-Bapaume road. The Germans have made only feeble efforts at counter-attack for they are occupied chiefly in constructing new defences to withstand the next allied assaults.

Fierce fighting is certain to take place before Bapaume. The Germans hold a strong line from Miramont that objectives would threaten south. Sully. The work preliminary to a new battle is being completed rapidly.

Dominion Ry Have Reserv

Heard Appeal of Local Ma Freight Privileges fo

The Dominion Board of Railway Commissioners reserved their decision yesterday afternoon after hearing statements from both sides concerned in the appeal made by the Dominion Steel Products Company and other local manufacturing concerns for a ruling of the board of interlocking privileges between the L. E. and N. and the G. T. and T. H. and B. Railways. In the case of the latter representatives of the Steel Products Company pointed out that a switch between it and L. E. and N. already existed, and had been used for the transportation construction material. The defence offered by the T. H. and B. was that this was the express purpose of the establishment of connection with the L. E. and N. The G. T. claimed that the issue was not of public necessity, but was based by the L. E. and N. line.

The plea made by the manufacturer was for a route whereby freight might be transferred from the railroads to the L. E. and N. he thus obviating the need of cart through the city streets.

Opening Ses Reichstag

Position of the Empire and Subm

Berlin, Thursday, via wireless Bayville, Sept. 23.—The following semi-official report of to-day's session of the Reichstag was given by the Overseas News Agency: "The Reichstag opened this afternoon. The galleries were crowded and the atmosphere was electric as military aspects had now reached a climax. On all fronts there was violent struggle for a decision. "Germany's position, the president, was satisfactory in every respect. He mentioned the arrival of the merchant submarines. Deut
