RESISTANCE WAS STUBBORN

More People Coming to Dawson-Two Hundred Left Skagway This Aorning for This City.

Pretoria, June 5, via Skagway, June 1. - Another substantial success is credited to Lord Kitchener. He surprised and completely put to rout a torce of Boers numbering all told more than 400 men. The Boer troops were under command of Gen. Beyers, who made a stubborn and protracted resistance. They were finally overcome and fled leaving 37 dead in the field. In the pursuit which followed too Boers were taken prisoners and floor cattle were captured.

Skagway, June 11,- The tide of truvel toward Dawson is still on the increase. Two hundred people left for Whitehorse this morning. Others will leave tomorrow.
