A MODERN UTOPIA.

An Interesting Report on the Pitcairn Islanders.

According to Commander Knowling, of H. M. S. Icarus, who visited Pitcairn Island last February, an almost Utopian state of existence prevails among its inhabitants, the descendants of the mutineers of the Bounty.

In his report to the Colonial Office, published as a Parliamentary paper, Commander Knowling states that of the total population of 126 a large proportion are young children.

There is a Parliament of seven elected members, including Mr. Jas. R. McCoy, the president and magistrate.

No one smokes or drinks intoxicants, and each adult man works from five a. m. to two p. m. for the public good, directed by the local Parliament. Two p. m. is the dinner hour, and the remainder of the day the people employ themselves about their own businesses. The women of the family do all the housework.

All rumors that the islanders are deteriorating in morals or physique are contradicted, and it is stated that disease is almost unknown, notwithstanding the fact that the taking of medicine is discontinued by the leading members.

The only troubles ahead mentioned in the report are the difficulty to select a successor to Mr. McCoy, the surplus of women, and a tendency among the islanders to use a species of Pidgin English, some of them already appearing slow of comprehension when addressed in English.

HOUSEHOLD RECIPES

RICE FLOUR CAKE

Four eggs, one cup sugar, scant cup of butter, one cupful rice flour. Flavor with vanilla. Beat well. M. A. W.

DOLLY VARDEN

One cup of sugar, scant half cup of butter, whites of three eggs, half cup of milk. Teaspoonful of salt, essence preferred. Two teaspoonful of baking powder, two cups of flour. Put cream, butter and sugar together, then add milk, acids, flour, baking powder; whites of eggs, beaten stiff, to be added last. A. C. J.

SOFT GINGER BREAD

One and a half cups molasses, one egg, one lump of butter size of egg, teaspoonful each of ginger and salt, three cups of sifted flour, mix well together. Add one teaspoonful of soda, dissolved in cup of boiling water. E. D. T.
