### WHEY BUTTER.

At a conference of Dominion dairy experts held in Ottawa last week "The Proper Branding Whey Butter was the subject of a paper read by Prof. G. G. Publow, chief dairy instructor for Eastern Ontario. Last year I38 factories manufactured 422,-000 pounds, or one fourth of the total amount creamery butter produced in Eastern Ontario. He took objections to the methods of some of the manu facturers of this dairy by-product, in "first class branding or labeling it as creamery butter." It was inferior in keeping qualities and although indis tinguishable from first class creamery butter when fresh providing it has been properly made, is an inferior art-There was a considerable amount of discussion on the subject and it is possible that legislation will be enacted compelling the manufacturers of whey butter to brand it as such. Mr Publow said that if such was not done it would hurt the good name of Canadian butter, especially if any quantity of it was exported.

## ASQUITH'S STATUS

Prorogatives of Office and tills Procodence a Matter of Doubt.

An interesting dibrussion has been soing on in the English newspapers as to the status of the British Prima Minister: Oddly enough, he had no status at all until very recently. His position in the table of precedence was defined by a royal warrant is used in 1806, shortly after fir Henry Campbell-Bannerman had formed his Government. Under terms of this warrant, while the precise prerogatives of the office remained undefined, the title and office itself were formally recognized, and a definite position in the table of precedence was assigned to the Minister holding them.

The Prime Minister, it was declared, was to "have place and precedence next after the Archbishop of York," a declaration placing him higher than any personage of the Blood the Primate of All England, the Lord High Chancellor, and the Primate of the Northern Province. In other words, the Prime Minister is now next to the Lord Chancellor, the highest dignitary of the state, though ranking after the two great dignitaries of the Church, and thus virtually enjoys the precedence accorded in former times to the Lord High Treasurer, joys the precedence accorded in for-mer times to the Lord High Treasurer, of whose extinct office the First Lord of the Treasury is to-day the chief

of the Treasury is to-day the chief representative.
At the same time it is important to note that the higher precedence was accorded not to the First Lord of the Treasury, but to the Prime Minister as such, though whether a new office, that of Prime Minister, was thereby created is not so clear. Consequently it is still doubtful whether there could be a Prime Minister who held no other office, though the question is never likely to become a practical one, since it is certain that the tion is never likely to become a prac-tical one, since it is certain that the office of Prime Minister has no salary attached to it, even if it were held that the Royal Warrant had recognised its separate existence.

Antipodean Optimists.

The people of sunny Australia and of misty New Zealand—the working people anyway—are persistent optimists. For twenty years they have been trying out one plan after another for the common good. The eighthour day was an established institution over there before we thought of it, except as an ideal. State old-age and invalidity pensions have been paid for some years, and the first steps taken toward the establishment of a minimum wage passed on the Antipodean Optimists steps taken toward the establishment of a minimum wage passed on the Australian standard of living. Postal savings banks, the parcel post and state life insurance have not driven state life insurance have not driven capital out of the country, even public ownership of the railroads, telegraph and telephone lines—and coal mines in New Zealand—has not convinced the capitalists that life is not worth living. Such paternalism as the furnishing of free transportation to men out of work and the loaning of money to enable those without means to take up public land have not only made valuable citizens of many who otherwise might have become wastrels, but have proved good investments. • • • They decided to enter politics and to secure by legislation politics and to secure by legislation the things most easily obtained in that manner, at the same time pressing forward, inch by inch, in the industrial field by means of the collective bargain, backed when needed by the strike and boycott. Thus was born the movement which, for the first time in history, has placed the wage earners in absolute control of the government of a nation.
