Rural mail deliveries in Ontario have resulted in the closing of 1,100 small post offices in this province in the last three years. Parcels post in Canada is a success, but the public are not taking full advantage of it. This was the principal point made at the annual meeting at Toronto on Tuesday of the Ontario Postmasters' Association, President William Hamilton of Uxbridge, in the chair. Secretary H. E. Proctor announced that \$7,856 had been collected for patriotic purposes.
