

In Spite of Everything-Lord Salisbury Makes That Clear-The War Must Proceed to Its Inevitable Issue and no Shade of Independence Will be Left the Boers.

OBJECTS TO THE SPEECH. Lord Kimberley, the Liberal leader in the house of lords, in the course of his remarks animadverted strongly upon the sudden dissolution of parliaupon the sudden dissolution of partial ment. He objected to the brevity and abruptness of the Queen's speech and demanded a definite pronouncement demanded a definite pronouncement of the government's policy in view of the novel and dangerous character of the recrudescence of hostilities in South Africa, and explanations of the alleged cruelties to the Boers, the burning of farms and similar severiburning of farms and similar severities, but trusted the government possessed a definite policy for speedily concluding the war. Has lordship was gratified at the Anglo-German agreement, but he said an attempt to capture the emperor and empress dowager of China would be an alarming under-

Lord Salisbury, after paying a tribute to the skill of Lord Roberts and Gen. Kitchener, and to the bravery of the officers and soldiers, jocularly approved of fall elections on the ground that the people objected to travelling to the poils in wintry weather, while in summer legislators were occupied with their parliamentary duties.

WAR POLICY OUTLINED. In regard to South Africa, the pre-
