PARTY IN GOOD SHAPE

Heated Period of Campaign Will Come After Holidays.

Mr. Whitney, Leader of the Opposition, Characterizes Globe's Story As a Silly Lie, and Gives a Specific Denial to That Meredith-Robertson Reference—Says He Has Been Approached By No One—Premier Ross Busy.

Toronto, Dec. 15.—The leader of the Opposition, J. P. Whitney, K. C., is viewing the political situation from the historic parlors of the Queen's. No more cautious and well-assured politician ever makes a pronouncement in Ontario politics, and Mr. Whitney's evident satisfaction at the present juncture speaks volumes for the chances of his party in the approaching election.

Asked last night if he had any announcement to make in view of affairs, he replied: "Oh, no, the Government has succeeded in getting a dissolution and the campaign is now on, with all that implies."

"Did you read The Globe's attack upon you yesterday, Mr. Whitney?" "About the Meredith-Robertson matter? Yes. Of course one cannot be expected to deny specifically every silly lie that is levelled against one. But I may say that no suggestion such as appeared with reference to the gentlemen was ever made to me directly or indirectly, at any time or place, by any person or persons. Under the circumstances I feel bound to say this."

"The Globe seems to find pleasure in nagging at you personally, Mr. Whitney?"

"Well, yes. But I will not reply to anything of that kind. A large majority of the people of Ontario have already replied to the reverend editor and to his masters in the Queen's Park on that point, and will very likely do so again."

"Have you decided anything about the campaign meetings, or have you arranged to hold any?"

"No doubt I will do so, but I have not considered the matter at all as yet."

Mr. Whitney will leave the city tomorrow or Saturday, but will return early in the week. From present appearances, the heated period of the campaign will not be reached till after the holidays. Mr. McCampbell, the Conservative organizer, considers the party in excellent shape for the fray.

R. R. Ganev arrived in Toronto yesterday morning. He is busy arranging to address meetings during the campaign and promises to be one of the leading factors in the situation.

Premier Ross was busy all day with callers and correspondence, and had not time to conclude his preparations for his first campaign meetings, two of which will probably be held next week.

PETERS DEFEATED.

Premier of Prince Edward Island Goes Under in "Special Votes."

Halifax, N.S., Dec. 15.—The Provincial election in Prince Edward Island has apparently resulted in the defeat of Premier Peters by one vote. Under the Provincial law a voter is entitled to vote in as many electoral districts as he may have property qualifications in, in addition to voting in the district where he resides. These votes outside of residence districts are called "special votes." The regular vote gave Premier Peters in his district of St. Peter's a majority of six, but when the special votes were counted yesterday the Premier was left one behind his opponent.

Protests in Quebec.

Montreal, Dec. 15.—A despatch from Sherbrooke says: "The election protests have been entered in this district, namely, Lovell, Liberal, Stanstead; Compton and Worthington, Conservatives, Sherbrooke. Protests have also been filed in the Federal elections in Terrebonne, Nicolet and Maskinonge. The defendants are Dr. Desjardins, Terrebonne; Hon. R. Lemieux, Nicolet, and Mr. Mayrand, Maskinonge. All are Liberals."

Patti's Farewell.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 15.—Madame Adeline Patti gave a concert here last night for the benefit of the Red Cross Society, which netted over \$37,000. Emperor Nicholas, members of the Imperial family and all the wealth and rank of the Russian capital were present. Mme. Patti announced that this was her final farewell to the concert stage.

Dead By Her Own Act.

Toronto, Dec. 15.—Coroner Crawford last night concluded his enquiry into the death of Mrs. Annie Patterson of 16 Grove avenue, whose body was found on the lake shore Dec. 7. The jury brought in a verdict: "That she came to her death by drowning. We believe her death was due to her own act."

Porte Yields to Britain.

Constantinople, Dec. 15.—In consequence of American and British representations the Porte has renewed its instructions to the provincial authorities to allow colporteurs to sell Bibles in towns and villages.

Arrive Safe At Kabul.

Pashawar, British India, Dec. 15.—The British mission to Afghanistan arrived safely, and in good health at Kabul, Dec. 12.
