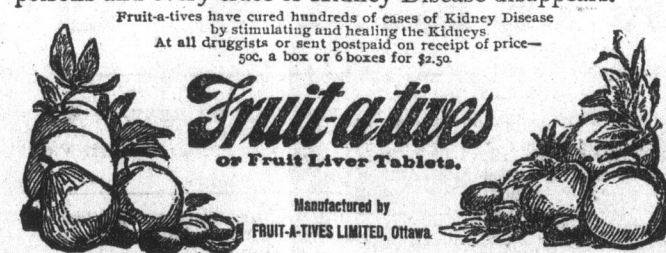

Mrs. Dowie also repudiated her husband, and their son, Gladstone Dowie, cast his lot with his mother and the new leader, Voliva.

HE CAN'T SIGN CHEQUES

Crown Attorney Curry Intervened and Phillips Gets Setback.

President of Defunct York Loan Co. Driven In Prison Van to the Police Court—Crown Attorney Continues His Efforts to Locate Real Owner of Certain Stock—A Highly Paid Lady Officer.

Toronto, April 3.—Joseph Phillips suffered at least two mortifications yesterday. In the first place, he was driven after breakfast in the police van from the jail to the court, as the carriage he had engaged was late, owing to a misunderstanding on the part of the driver. Then, when, just before the adjournment until to-morrow at noon, day, he was preparing to sign a cheque to his lawyer, J. E. Jones, Crown Attorney Curry intervened.

"I will not give my permission to his signing any cheques the way things are now," he said.

An air of mystery at the morning session was imparted by evidence concerning "Joan McCann," whose name appears as a large holder of Toronto Life stock, and who is alleged to be in New York at the present time. But the books do not tend to point out that the company received from her the face value of the stock.

Miss Georgiana Hudson said that Joan, who had some years ago been a clerk in the York County, but for a very short time, was of medium height, pretty stout and about 38 years of age. It appeared the widow, Joan McCann, also a nurse, had traveled quite a bit, Miss Hudson had no power of attorney for her.

"Did you ever sign as a witness to a signature you didn't see signed?"

"Yes."

"What? Without seeing it signed?"

"Yes, if I knew it was her own signature."

Who Owns the Stock?

"This stock here was transferred to Miss Daw. How was that? Did she get it?" went on Mr. Curry.

"No, but I thought I had got her to buy it. I paid for it with my own money. It was then transferred to me."

"Where did you get the money?"

"I've always had money."

"Yes, but pardon me, you are dealing here in large transactions, and I doubt if they were all genuine. Why were 25 shares of stock also transferred to Miss Daw?"

"I thought she would like 25 shares."

"Did you see her sign this in the book on Oct. 13?"

"Yes."

"Whose name does the stock stand in?"

"Miss Daw's."

"And she hasn't paid a dollar for it," said Mr. Curry.

The witness replied that something had been paid.

Miss Daw had held 75 shares in the Toronto Life in her own name. The names of the large number of shareholders read out showed that in most cases they were either agents or employees of the York Loan, nearly all their stock had been transferred to Miss McCann, a Mrs. Sutton, Miss Daw and the witness and several others.

"Whoever actually owns this stock—and I have my own idea as to who is the real owner and who are the dupes—who possess business that has cash value of over \$150,000," said Crown Attorney Curry.

What Mr. Burt Knows.

Regarding the piano money, which, she said, was deposited in the Bank of Montreal, Miss L. Hudson, who bore traces of illness, declared that Mr. Burt knew what the cheques Phillips signed were for.

"Mr. Burt," said the crown attorney, "don't know anything about them. The \$3,000 cheque was certified on July 1, 1905. What was that for?"

"\$2,200 went for Toronto Life stock, and some for my salary. I was getting \$1 a week from January, 1905."

Miss Hudson remarked that she had not received any money in respect to her services for the List Piano Co. for 80 weeks, but she was receiving \$25 a week salary from the York County Loan.

"Did you know that the cheque for \$2,500 was used for the purchase of a house for Mr. Phillips?"

"No; I made out cheques. I don't ask questions." Witness added that she had worked also for The National Monthly at \$5 a week, but not after they took over the List Piano business. The books of the Piano company had been copied from slips.

Miss Lillian Hudson was unaware as to where The National Monthly got its money. She confessed equal ignorance concerning a cheque for \$10,000 from The National Monthly to the York County Loan.

Endorsed But Never Received Money.

"You have endorsed it on the back," said Crown Attorney Curry, showing her the cheque.

"Well, I may have done that, but I never received the money."

"Where did it go?" asked the court.

"About this time," said the Crown Attorney, "Phillips drew out a similar sum from the York County Loan. That National Monthly cheque I think went to purchase \$2,000 worth of Canadian Northern bonds guaranteed by the Manitoba Government."

"But where are they?"

"I am not in a position to say at present, but I think I can prove that later," said Mr. Curry.

Forged Father's Name.

St. Catharines, April 3.—William Smithers of Thorold was yesterday morning arrested at Beamsville charged with having forged the name of his father, who lives at Stamford, to a note which was purchased by Albert Shrimpton at Niagara Falls. Smithers fled to Beamsville, where he was found at the home of James Stanley, a colored man. He made an attempt to escape through a dense bush, but failed.

Farmer Suicides.

Stratford, April 3.—James Dunseth, lot 4, concession 13, Downie, committed suicide by shooting himself in the head with a gun. He was an elderly man, in the best of health, and no cause can be given for his rash act. He was found lying dead on the floor at his home.

MINISTERIAL CHANGES

Those Coming May Admit Arch. Campbell to the Cabinet.

Hon. Wm. Paterson Slated For Senate Leadership—Probable Early Retirement of Sir Richard Cartwright and Hon. R. W. Scott—A Quiet Day In the House—Telephone Committee Discontinued For Good.

Ottawa, April 3.—Cabinet changes are talked about, especially in Ontario. The one first to come off, so the report goes, is the retirement of Sir Richard Cartwright and Hon. R. W. Scott from the Government, and at least one of them from the Senate, and the promotion of Hon. Wm. Paterson to the Senate as a Government leader there. This would let Arch. Campbell of Centre York into the Cabinet as the new Minister from Ontario.

Mr. Fitzpatrick's bill respecting the better observance of the Lord's Day comes up for a second reading to-day. The House was only in session for two hours yesterday, and the proceedings were quite devoid of interest.

Alexander C. Ross, the new member for (North Cape Breton and Victoria) was introduced by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Alex. Johnston (South Cape Breton).

"Phone Enquiry Ended."

Mr. James Wilson, Minister of Railways and Canals, in answer to a question by Mr. Baker (Hamilton), admitted that he was a stockholder and formerly an officer of the New Brunswick Petroleum Co. Matthew Lodge of Moncton is secretary of the company.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier said in reply to Mr. Macdonnell (South Toronto) that the telephone committee of last session would not be continued nor will a new committee be appointed.

In reply to several questions the announcement was made by the Minister of Customs that no official notice had as yet been received as to the changes in the German tariff effective March 1.

\$100,000 For Winnipeg Press.

Hon. Mr. Oliver, Minister of the Interior, gave some figures as to the amounts paid by his department during the past five years to The Winnipeg Free Press and Der Nordwester Publishing companies. They aggregate about \$100,000.

The act to incorporate the Woman's Art Association of Canada was read a second time yesterday.

The G. T. P. Contracts.

The tenders and awards re the building of the two sections of the Grand Trunk Pacific were reported by the National Transcontinental Commission to the Minister of Railways, and will be announced, it is said, to-day.

TO OVERTHROW CASTRO.

New York and Paris Capital is Financing An Army Expedition to Capture Venezuela.

New York, April 3.—One of the largest merchants in New York said Sunday night that arrangements are being perfected here and in Paris for a revolution in Venezuela which will annihilate Castro and open up that country to American capital and enterprise.

A number of rich New York merchants are said to be interested in the movement, which the promoters declare will involve the employment of 15,000 soldiers and the expenditure of \$5,000,000 in the campaign. President Castro, if the plans do not go astray, is to be expelled or destroyed and a native Venezuelan statesman to be installed as his successor.

In this connection it is said that Castro, anticipating a successful revolution against him sooner or later, has converted some of his alleged \$40,000,000 fortune into cash and has sent it to America and France.

Charles B. Ferguero, Venezuelan consul in New York, said Sunday night at his home that he had heard an expedition was being organized or projected, but had been unable to learn anything definite about it. He said he had understood shares in the scheme were being sold.

"I would like to get hold of one of those shares," he said. "I would buy all that was offered."

The consul inquired eagerly as to the point the expedition was to sail from.

The expedition is to set out shortly from Europe in three large steamships, which are already under contract. They are to carry about 5,000 volunteers, with the following quantities of arms and ammunition: 8,000 mauler rifles of the latest pattern; 24,000 rounds of cartridges; 5,000 shells, eight rapid-fire guns, 8,000 army belts, 1,000 officers' swords, 1,000 officers' revolvers, 3,000 machetes and swords and other supplies.

Japan Thanks Canada.

Ottawa, April 3.—The Japanese Government have instructed Hon. T. Nozue, their Consul-General in Ottawa, as follows: "Convey to the Canadian Government the sincere thanks of the Imperial Japanese Government for their philanthropic donation in relief of the famine sufferers. (Signed) Marquis Saloni. Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs."

Not Guilty.

Philadelphia, April 3.—Walter Wood and Stuart Wood, members of the firm of R. D. Wood & Co., iron manufacturers of this city were found not guilty in the United States court here yesterday of accepting a rebate on a shipment to Winnipeg. The amount of the alleged rebate was \$1,250.53.

Sugar Duties Stay.

London, April 3.—In the House of Lords yesterday Lord Denman (Liberal), replying for the Government, said the Ministers would not agree to a reduction in the excise duty on sugar in case a beet sugar industry is not started in Great Britain.

Threaten General Strike.

Warsaw, Russian Poland, April 3.—The revolutionists here have announced their intention to declare a general strike to prevent the Government from contracting a new loan.
