ARE INSOLVENT
Cincinnati, Dec. 4.—The Cincinnati, Hamilton and Dayton and the Pere Marquette Railroads to-day were ordered placed in the hands of receiver by United States Circuit Judge Henry Lurton, and Judson Harmon, formerly United States Attorney-General, was appointed receiver, giving bonds for \$200,000.

Application for a receiver was made by Attorney Lawrence Maxwell, Jr., on behalf of Walter B. Horn, of New York, a creditor of both roads, and was agreed to by the defendants in answers admitting the principal charges of insolvency.

A POOR LIGHT
A resident of Lorne avenue was very much annoyed this morning with the electric light department. He says the light on the corner of Lorne avenue and Raleigh street is very seldom lit and the people in that vicinity have to grope around in the dark in muddy weather. The street there is at present torn up and this makes matters much worse.

"It is not the man's fault, as he attends the light every day," said the resident, "and I saw him there at nine o'clock last night trying to make it burn. The Property committee should see that a proper light is put on this corner."

PLUMBERS CASE IN COURT.
Hearing Begun Before Mr. Justice Clute in Toronto Assizes.

Toronto, Dec. 5.—Mr. Justice Clute resumed the hearing of the Plumbers' case in the Assize Court yesterday and will keep at it from day to day now until it is completed. The evidence given was along the same lines as that which has been given in the other case in the Police Court, regarding penalties, bonuses, the agreement with the Union for a mutual house-cleaning, the effort to keep off competition, and the agreements with supply houses through which it was sought to cripple independent plumbers.

Trampled to Death.
Brockville, Dec. 5.—The death occurred in the General Hospital of Albert Breese, one of the promising young farmers of this district. The other afternoon he had ridden one of the farm horses to an enclosure on the farm to drive out some horses that are pasturing. Just what occurred will never be known, for he was alone. It is supposed he fell from the horse he was riding, and was trampled upon by the others. He unconsciously dragged himself to the house, and later was removed to Brockville. An examination showed that the base of the skull was terribly injured. Breese was only thirty-three years of age and unmarried.

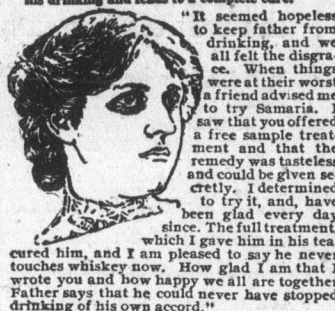
More Marine Disasters.

Guelph, Dec. 5.—James J. Lowes, a former well-known resident of Guelph, is dead as a result of injuries sustained in being struck by a falling tree at his home, 12th line, Peel. On Friday, Lowes, in company with his son and others were in the bush chopping wood. They were cutting down a tree of unusual size when it broke in two and fell. One portion struck Lowes across the back, and several of his ribs were broken, and he sustained severe internal injuries. Deceased was 69 years of age. Besides a widow, three daughters and two sons survive.

St. Catharines, Dec. 5.—A gas explosion occurred yesterday morning in the Nasmith Co. bakery. Miss Mary Goff, a clerk in the store, was burned on the head and arm, and William Lyon, foreman of the cake department, is in the hospital suffering from bad burns on the head, face and chest.
