C. E. I. Sports Programme

At a meeting of the C.E.I. Athletic Association on Tuesday night, Mr. T. Hallett in the chair, the matter of participating in the coming season's sports was discussed at length. It was unanimously decided to enter a team in the baseball league, and a committee consisting of Messrs. Harsant, R. Knight and A. H. Thomas was appointed to look after the formation of the same. Practice will commence as soon as outfits can be imported from the States. Football will again be on the programme, and with the new material at hand it is hoped to have an even stronger team than last season. A Hennebury was elected captain; G. Adams, vice-captain, and E. Churchill, league delegate. A committee of three, Messrs. W. Stranger, R. Evans and J. Edwards, with the captain and vice-captain, will choose the players for every game. Crews for the amateur and football races at the Regatta will be arranged by Messrs. T. Hallett and A. Hennebury. Mr. R. Knight was appointed Secretary-Treasurer of the Association, which now has a membership of 75. A committee was also appointed to arrange for a dance to be held in the C.C.C. Hall during the present month.

Young Men Meet

At a meeting in the Board of Trade Rooms last night, Mr. J. R. Smallwood presiding, it was decided to form a Young Men's League. Those present were Messrs. Harold Pike, W. Learning, W. Sparkes, J. Hynes, J. S. Roseworthy, Mac Morgan, J. Osmond, and Lawrence Cullen. The latter was appointed chairman. The League will be of a non-sectarian, non-political nature, the object to be to educate young men in the three ideals set forth in the pledge, which reads, "For purity of mind, health of body and cheerfulness of spirit, I will ever strive." All between the ages of 18 to 30 years may become members on taking the above pledge. It is hoped to establish branches in the outports, and have debating, sporting and recreation clubs. The matter of what part the League will take in connection with Prohibition will be decided at the next general meeting.

GRANTED DIVORCE.



Mrs. Daniel G. Reid was given an absolute divorce from the "Tin Plate King" by a jury which had been out only three minutes in Judge McAvoy's part of the Supreme Court in New York city. The jury also found Mr. Reid guilty of the charges of misconduct.

The verdict came as a climax to a morning filled with dramatic events, which concluded when Mrs. Reid took the stand and denied emphatically that she was guilty of the charge of being unfaithful to her husband.

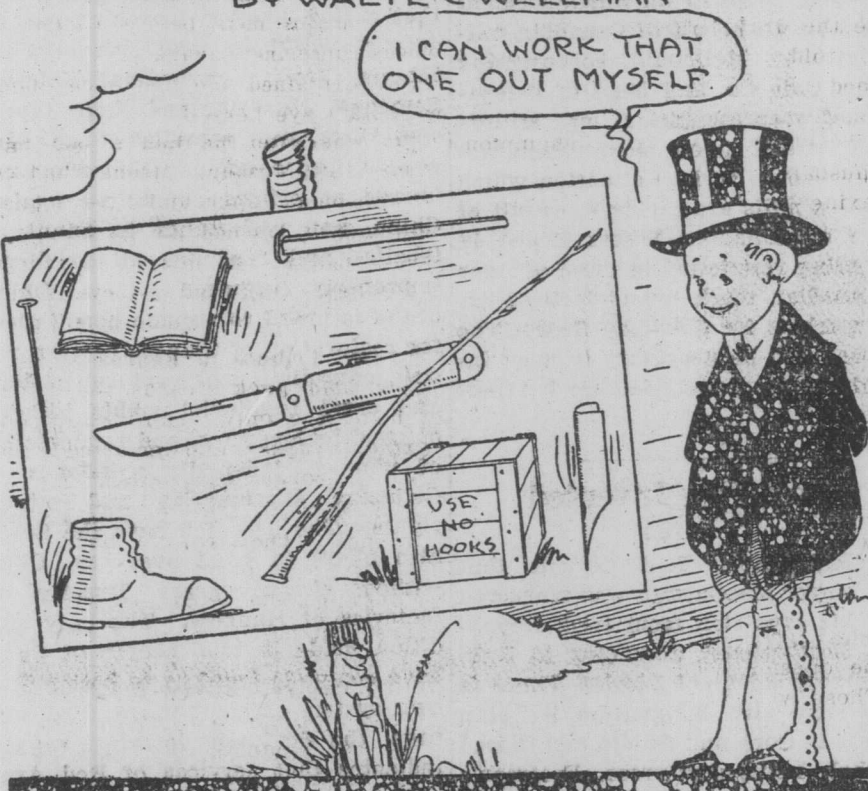

As To Essences

(To the Editor.)
Dear Sir,—I am instructed to forward the press for publication copy of a Resolution passed at a Committee meeting of the Moderate Prohibitionists held on Monday night last, relative to the import and sale of spirituous Essence.

Resolution passed at a Committee meeting of the Moderate Prohibitionists held on Monday night, March 29, 1920:

WHEREAS the excessive drinking of spirituous essence is on the increase with deplorable results;

AND WHEREAS it is desirable to prevent persons from becoming drunk on this essence;

AND WHEREAS it is not desirable, nor is it necessary, that persons who use this article for culinary and manufacturing purposes should be deprived of their right to do so;

AND WHEREAS a doubt exists in the mind of one, at least, of the Judges of the Supreme Court as expressed in his judgment in the case of Soper, appellant, vs. Byrne, respondent, as to whether any power is given the Governor-in-Council to prohibit the sale and importation of the article;

BE IT RESOLVED that this committee, appointed at a large and representative public meeting of citizens of St. John's to endeavour to secure a modification of said Prohibition

Acts, is of opinion that the Governor-in-Council should take necessary powers or steps under any Act now in force or which may hereafter be enacted to control and regulate, but not to prohibit absolutely the importation and sale of said Essence.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Committee is of opinion that a rationing system be put into operation so that householders may be supplied periodically with small quantities of said Essence sufficient for ordinary household purposes and that manufacturers of cakes and confections may procure sufficient quantities of the same under stringent regulations designed to prohibit the use of same for any but bona fide flavoring purposes.

Charlie Chaplin's Domestic Trouble

Divorce Proceedings to be Instituted—Not Living With Wife, Latter Says.

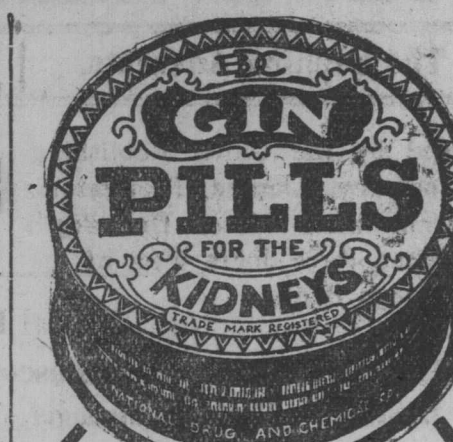
LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 20.—Domestic troubles in the family of Charlie Chaplin, which have been known to friends as having existed for several months, are soon to culminate in a suit for divorce filed by Mrs. Chaplin, known in the film world as Mildred Harris.

Chaplin is said to have stated that he will file a counter suit in the event of action being taken by his wife. This is by no means the first time that the family affairs of the Chaplins have been the topic of gossip in the moving picture colony here, but more importance is attached at this time than ever before.

When seen at his club Thursday morning the comedian said that he had no statement to make and his attorney, Arthur Wright, would not talk for him. It is said, however, that Mrs. Chaplin has become aware that her husband was preparing to file a suit and made her intention to appeal to the courts now in an attempt to stop Chaplin's action. The only direct statement of Mrs. Chaplin was made when she said "I have not seen Mr. Chaplin in two weeks and he has not been living with me for several months. I am forced to conclude that he does not want to live with me. I do not want a divorce neither do I want Mr. Chaplin's money, but I must have support." Chaplin's only reply to this statement was, "Oh, well; such is life in the great west." Attorneys for Mrs. Chaplin state that Chaplin has visited their client at her Oxford street home many times in an effort to persuade her to accept \$25,000 and file suit in Nevada on "nominal grounds."
