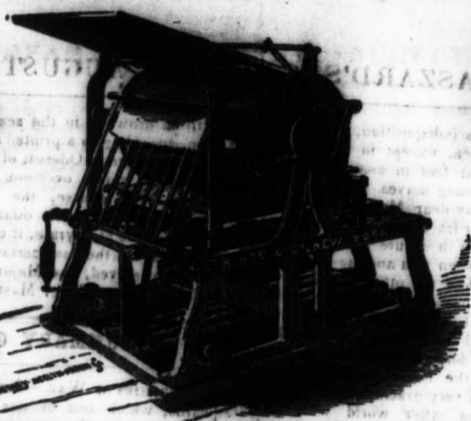

THE CROPS.

THE HARVEST—AN ESTIMATE OF THE YIELD. The late rains have proved a Godsend to the speculators and monopolists who seek to bolster up prices by creating an alarm; but they will happily be disappointed, as we perceive from our various exchanges, that the damage done to the crops has been very slight, and that on the whole the harvest will be superabundant. Mr. George Peabody of London, is said, but surely falsely, to have lent himself to the alarmists by the assertion, that Europe will require the whole of our surplus produce notwithstanding the notoriety of the fact that the harvest there appears as plentiful as here.

"From reliable data we show that Illinois alone will produce this year sixteen millions of bushels of wheat, or nearly one-tenth of the whole crop of the country. Ohio, twenty millions; Indiana twelve millions; these three States producing more than one fourth of the whole."

An estimate is given of the growth of wheat in the different States and territories in 1855, as compared with 1847 and 1850, and with the following result:—Total 1847, 114,245,500 bushels; 1850, 1,047,150 bushels; and 1855, 175,200,000 bushels. These estimates indicate a product of 75 per cent. beyond that of 1850—or 175,000,000 in the aggregate. If we allow 3 1-2 bushels of wheat per head, or one hundred millions of bushels for home consumption, we shall then have on hand for export or for future stock about 75,000,000.

In certain States, the increase this year, from 1850, will not be less than 120 per cent. The deficiency in New England and some of the Southern States, who do not grow so much as they consume, is estimated at 12,455,000 bushels. In the other States the excess produced over the quantity consumed is estimated at 9,600,000 bushels. For seed and stock twenty millions is set apart, and we are then shown a surplus for export of 64,150,000 bushels. Texas and Oregon produce a much greater number of bushels to the acre than any of the other principal wheat growing States.—Boston Evening Traveller.

TESTIMONIALS TO NEALE DOW.

At the close of the late Maine State Conference of Congregationalists, at Portland, a grand Temperance Meeting was held in Rev. Dr. Dwight's Church. Hon. Neal Dow was called to preside. After several earnest speeches by different clergymen, it was announced that by the liberality of a gentleman of Portland, Hon. Neal Dow had been constituted a Life Member of the *Women's Friend Society*. The Agents of the *American Tract Society* then came forward, and announced that by similar generous donations, Mr. Dow had also been constituted a Life Member of their respective societies. The audience was agreeably entertained by the pleasant episode in the proceedings. It is cheering to observe that while Neal Dow has been malignantly assailed by venal pressmen and unscrupulous partisans, who have sought to destroy him, his good name has grown brighter.—*American Temperance Union*.

RENTS IN CALIFORNIA.—A letter writer from San Francisco, thus speaks of the fall in the prices of real estate in that city; and the consequent reduction in the incomes of its owners:—"The enormous incomes of some real estate holders have dwindled down at a most rapid and fearful rate, and, though already small, continue to become beautifully less." I am now moving into a house at \$40 per month, which four months since readily brought \$115 per month, and 'fancy rents' have declined at even a greater ratio. The United States' bondrd warehouses, for which \$6000 per month was originally paid, would not at this moment command one-fourth of that rate; and under a clause in the lease, which provides for a re-valuation of the rent every two years, by disinterested persons, will no doubt at the next biennial valuation, if proper attention is paid to the matter by the Government officials, be reduced accordingly.
