day, September 17th at the Church of Transfiguration, New York City. William Nicols was born at Southampton England, on Oct. 1, 1863. He was educated at St. John's College, Hertsford, England, receiving his degree in 1882. He left England for the Canadian Northwest where he completed his studies for the ministry at the Theological College at Winnipeg, Manitoba. Twenty-six years of work on the western prairies followed, of which seventeen were spent at St. Barnabas Church, Medicine Hat, Alberta. Owing to ill health he resigned from St. Barnabas in 1908 and was subsequently appointed Rector of the Parish of Newcastle, New Brunswick. He left there in 1910 for Port Mulgrave, Nova Scotia, and in 1912 resigned temporarily because of illness.

In 1913 he resumed work in Halifax as Chaplain of Immigration and in 1914 was transferred to Quebec for work among the departing Canadian troops, becoming Chaplain of the famous and ill fated Princess Patricia's regiment.

When immigration was closed on account of the war, he became Rector of the Parish of LeHave, Nova Scotia and in 1918 removed to New York where he was chaplain at the Seaman's Church Institute. About a year and a half ago he was called to Trinity Church Northport, New York.

During the early part of his pastorate in this village, William Nicols revealed himself as a Christian ideal

ist, a devoted and faithful follower and preacher of The Christ. As was said of him in Trinity Church on Sunday morning to meet him and to talk with him was almost to get a glimpse of Jesus of Nazareth passing by. His ministry gave promise of great success until disease overtook him and impaired to a great degree not only his physical vigor but his mental vision.

For a long period of years in the Church, William Nicols fought a good fight and upheld the faith. One cannot doubt that he rests peacefully in the loving arms of the Master whom he worshipped and glorified.—Northport Journal.

## ESTIMATES OF CROPS IN MARITIME PROVINCES

Heavier crops of potatoes than last year in Nova Scotia are to be expected according to estimates of the commercial production of fruit and vegetables in Canada made by the federal fruit branch of the Department of Agriculture which it is stated should fairly accurately represent the crops this year. The Maritime estimates are as follows:

New Brunswick—Apples, 25 per cent in excess of last year, or 41,250 barrels. Potatoes 60 per cent of last year or 9,715,200 bushels. Prince Edward Island—Potatoes 75 per cent of 1921 or 4,474,500 bushels.

Nova Scotia—Apples 80 per cent 1921 or about 1,628,800 barrels. Potatoes, 110 per cent of last year or 7,055,400 bushels.

**TIME OF MIRAMICHI FIRE**  
It has been pointed out that conditions are much drier than during last October and every precaution should be taken to prevent the spread of fires. The Great Miramichi Fire in 1825 occurred in October after a dry September. Hunters are asked to be exceptionally careful of fire when in the woods. An unextinguished cigarette or camp fire is bound to cause a forest fire which will spread very rapidly these hot windy days.

## Crown Has Eight Witnesses Against Sir Montague Allan

Montreal, Oct. 5.—Subpoenas were issued at the court house today for eight witnesses who will appear for the crown against Sir. H. Monague Allan, president of the defunct Merchants' Bank of Canada, when he faces trial on a charge of having negligently signed a return to the federal government which contained a false statement in connection with the bank's financial position. D. C. Macarow, former general manager of the Merchants' Bank, was recently acquitted of the charge of making the false statement. The date set for the hearing of the charge against Sir Montague is October 12.

### GOVERNMENT MEETING

The meeting of the Provincial Government is expected to be held this week beginning on Wednesday at St. John where several delegations will be heard. Upon the day following the government will meet in Fredericton to attend to routine business.
