MEMPHIS, July 19, 1879.

A negro named Napoleon Bonaparte was hanged at Sardis, Miss., yesterday for the murder of Tom Butler, colored on the 6th of last August. The execution was witnessed by 3,000 persons, principally negroes. The condemned man addressed the assemblage from the scaffold, warning his hearers against evil temper.
