A Montreal despatch says that in consequence of the new mining regulations of the Quebec Government, laborious owners and operators have resolved to shut down. Two thousand miners are thus thrown out of work in one district.

The residence and shop of Mr. Leo Chevrolet, tailor, of Sooria, was destroyed by fire early Thursday morning. The blaze started through the exploding of a furnace lamp. The loss of Mr. Chevrolet, including contents, is estimated at \$10,000.

The heat at Montreal and Toronto during the latter part of the week was excessive. Friday at Montreal the thermometer registered 84 and at Toronto 88 in the shade. A Toronto man named Wm Simpson was protruded with sunstroke.

The London & NorthWestern railway has as its engine, "Number 1182," which recently completed its millionth mile, a feat which the company claim is without parallel in the annals of railway engineering.

An un-successful attempt was made to sink the D'Almeida, N.S. schooner Edward A. Horton on her last fishing trip to the Banks.

Some men were frisked a rock to the plug in the vessel's boiler, with an eighteen inch lamp line while at the wharf there, which was not discovered until after the vessel arrived back to port. Fortunately, although the vessel poked out the heavy gear during her absence two months, she returned in a ribbed condition, and the lives of eighteen men were endangered.

The Sultan of Turkey has addressed a circular to the powers in explanation of the passage through the Bosphorus of several vessels of the Russian volunteer fleet. The circular says that for several years past, flying the commercial flag of Russia, have been running in the Bosphorus and in the Sea of Marmora.
