RAILWAYS BLEED UNITED STATES POST OFFICE... Washington, July 29.—A general order has been issued by the post office department which will result in reducing the compensation enjoyed by the railroads for carrying the mails by at least \$1,000,000 annually.

On the other hand, the railroads insist that it is the province of the post office department to designate the cars which shall be used on the mail routes and that the roads are now using such cars as were actually ordered by the department.

CRIME SOMEWHAT PREVALENT. An interesting blue book on criminal statistics for 1906 has just been issued from Ottawa.

Minor Offenders Increase. The number of offenders under 18 years of age has also increased during the year, the figures being 800 for 1905 against 890 for 1906.

Indictable Offences by Classes. The number of convictions in the case of offences against the person including murder, manslaughter, rape, assault, etc., has increased by 15 during the year, the figures being 1,029 for 1905 against 1,044 for 1906.
