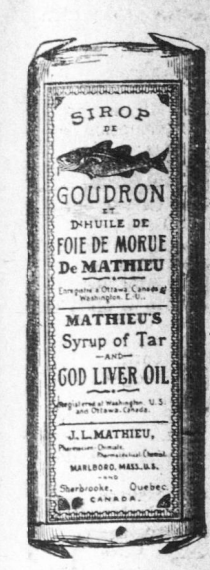

## Another Tramp Steamer Arrives.

S. S. Albenza Badly Battered—Some of the Men Injured.  
The S. S. Albenza, Capt. Lorenzo, arrived here yesterday at 3 p.m. from London, Sweden, for Philadelphia, with about 5,000 tons of iron ore as cargo. The vessel was on the run to this port 26 days. The ship had terrific weather on the run across the Atlantic and showed the effects of it as she entered the Narrows. Shortly after leaving Lulu the weather became bad and the ship had a terrible time of it before she reached North Shields where her stay was short. After leaving that port she again encountered fierce weather, the wind reached hurricane force and the ship often strained and laboured heavily in the trough of the sea, giant waves often boarding her and sweeping her from stem to stern. The storm of Saturday was the worst she experienced to that time and this tried her staying powers severely. The steering gear was the first to give out and while the engineers tried to repair it the ship lay helplessly in the trough of the sea. Tons of water swept on board, the decks were stove in, the funnels cracked and the rudder and machinery disabled, while the ship was seen to be making water when the pumps were tried. The engineers worked well and the seamen could only get about the decks with difficulty some of them being thrown around the decks and injured though not seriously, while an engineering was also being done when the ship was being repaired. The ship was estimated last night that the cost of effecting repairs would be approximately \$28,000. When the weather moderated the vessel bore up for this port, coming along slowly in the high sea running. On reaching port a doctor visited the injured men and attended to them. The ship was built in 1898, is owned by the Union S. S. Co. of Hamburg and is 2,700 tons net. Mr. Tasker Cook will supply the ship, and Bowring Bros. are her agents.

## The Evening Chit-Chat

"Some time ago," writes one of my letter-friends, "you suggested that good pictures were safe and desirable wedding gifts because they were unlikely to be duplicated, and one seldom has too many of them. Now I often feel that I would like to give a picture not only for a wedding gift, but on other occasions, but I know very little about art and don't know just what pictures would be sure to be acceptable. Could you publish a list of some of the best pictures so that I would know what to ask for the next time I go picture shopping?"  
Having heard this same feeling expressed by others, I am the more willing to comply with this request to the best of my ability. Art critics will please not read and scoff. This is intended for plain people.  
In the first place, my correspondent will doubtless be interested in knowing what are called the twelve world famous pictures. I believe the list was made by a great art critic and has been generally accepted by the art world.  
These are "The Night Watch" by Rembrandt; "The Descent from the Cross" by Rubens; "The Immaculate Conception" by Murillo; "The Aurora" by Guido Rheni (called the finest decorative picture in the world); "La Noche" by Correggio; "The Last Judgment" by Michael Angelo; "The Transfiguration" and "The Sistine Madonna" by Raphael; "The Last Supper" by Leonardo di Vinci; "The Communion of St. Jerome" by Domenichino; and "The Descent from the Cross" by Daniele Da Volterra.  
Any one of the great Madonnas is always an excellent gift. Besides Raphael's "Sistine Madonna" which is called the greatest of all the paintings of the Virgin, some of the finest Madonnas are Raphael's "Madonna of the Chair" and also "Madonna del Gran Duca"—so-called because the Grand Duke for whom it was painted carried it around with him everywhere he went and worshipped before it as a shrine—and the "Virgin of the Rocks" by Verrochio. The "Madonna of the Lilies" by Botticelli is a lovely picture. A Madonna that has been very popular recently.

It would be difficult, indeed, to find anyone who would not be pleased with a good print of some of Millet's wonderful paintings. Some of the best are "The Sowers," "The Cleaners," "The Shepherd by Night," "The Water Carrier" and "The Angelus."  
Joshua Reynolds' "Innocence" and any of his angels' heads, Gainsborough's "Blue Boy" and his "Portrait of Mrs. Siddons" make excellent prints. For one who is fond of animals, some of Landseer or Rosa Bonheur's work would probably be pleasing. Rossetti's "Beata Beatrix" and "The Girlhood of the Virgin" are beautiful modern conceptions and almost anything of Burne Jones would probably please anyone who likes the modern school.

Of course, this is not by any means an exhaustive list. Merely a very few sketchy suggestions to the person who wants to buy good pictures and does not feel that he knows enough about art to select anything good at random.

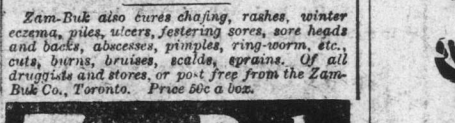



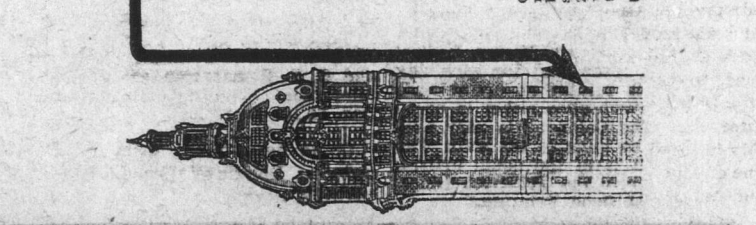
