Special to Evening Telegram. PRESQUE ISLE, Maine, Oct. 1st. A snow storm, the first for the season, caused heavy loss to farmers in this section. Fruit and shade trees were broken down by the weight of damp snow. Standing grain was damaged, and the telephone wires broken in many places.

Special to Evening Telegram. BERLIN, Oct. 1st. The Bourse was to-day affected by a war scare. Heavy selling orders evoked only a slight response. Prices generally fell heavily. Representatives of one big banking group said this morning, that they believed war to be inevitable. Other bankers, more optimistic, although regarding the situation with serious concern, profess to believe that the powers will be able at the last moment to intervene successfully.

Special to Evening Telegram. BALTIMORE, Oct. 1st. Delegates from all parts of this country and a number of foreign nations, including British, Danes, and Chinese, assembled to-day at the 21st annual convention of the Association of military surgeons of the United States. Important topics from tobacco and liquor in camp, to the prevention of contagious diseases will be discussed. The sessions will continue until Friday.

Special Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, Oct. 1st. At a dinner given in honor of Sir George Reid, High Commissioner for Australia to Britain, and Lady Reid by the City Club, Sir George said Australia was building a fleet, costing \$65,000,000, not through a spirit of adventure, but for the protection of the island continent. He declared that although he was a lover of peace, he could see that the only way to keep peace is to be strong enough to whip any one, who would threaten it. Sir George said there was no sense in the talk of war between England and Germany.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Oct. 1st. The opinion of the Government as to the Ulster Demonstration is summed up in the words of Sir Rufus Isaacs, who said when addressing his constituents at Reading:—"I speak for the Government when I say that these incidents in Ulster will not turn us one hair's breadth. We are undismayed and undaunted by all these performances, and shall pursue our policy calmly and patiently, with such wisdom as we can bring to bear upon the questions which we have to deal with. We shall carry the Home Rule Bill through the Commons and I venture to predict that before the end of this year the Bill will emerge from the Commons after having passed its third reading."

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Oct. 1st. Most urgent and categorical representations in favour of the preservation of peace, have been made to Sofia by the Russian Foreign Minister. The other members of the triple entente, France and Britain, are likewise using their good influences, while the members of the triple alliance, Germany, Austria and Italy are just as determined to prevent an outbreak of hostilities. The Powers have again brought before the Porte in the most friendly manner, the urgent necessity
