Gas, it may be said, vitiates the at-cosphere. True. But it also helps to purify it. Its purifying power is greater than its vitiating power. Electricity does not vitiate, nor does it purify. Hear what three eminent men

have said:— Much evidence has lately been adduced to show that gas is more useful than the electric light in promoting ef-ficent ventilation of air. It is for this, mongst other reasons, that gas is heing frequently substituted for the elec-tric light. The latest example is, per-haps, the Society of Medical Officers of Health, which has recently installed gas on its premises, after experience with the electric light.-Dr. Jamleson B. Hurry.
