HOW TO AVOID WRINKLES.

Don't narrow your eyes when you wish to be impressive. If you draw your mouth into a button and allow deep lines to pucker between your eyes you will acquire an habitual cross expression.

Learn to avoid the lip biting, eye-brow raising and eye narrowing habits. If you have already been unfortunate enough to acquire wrinkles, massage them daily with cold cream and try to spirit them away.

When you massage the wrinkled skin pinch it quite gently crosswise of the line of the wrinkle. Do not leave the cold cream on overnight, as it will make the facial muscles flabby. Plenty of cold cream will be absorbed by the pores during the massage.

This will remove any destructive accumulation of dust and close the pores afterwards. The effect on the skin is not one of overaction, but of stimulation. When your skin is soft once more do not spoil the whole value of your care by allowing the unpleasant thought wrinkles to mar its surface.
