

He was sworn in as a Solicitor in 1893 and called to the bar, obtained silk and became a Bachelor of the Law Society. In 1907, three years after he entered politics he was made Minister of Justice. In 1900 he represented Newfoundland at Washington in connection with the fishery dispute which was being referred to the Hague, and in the spring of 1914 became official leader of the opposition in the House


