





Dear Sir.—In last evening's issue of the one time fishermen's organ, Mr. W. B. Jennings, Minister of Public Works takes exception to certain remarks made by Mr. W. D. Sainsbury at the mass meeting held in the C.L.B. Armoury on Wednesday night, wherein the latter gentleman stated that some people in Green Bay last winter had to live on salt herring and spruce tea. Mr. Sainsbury did make that allegation, and with, I presume, as much knowledge of existing conditions as Mr. Jennings professes to possess. That worthy gentleman whose only metier is a knowledge of the cubic contents of bundles of "splices" for government institutions is a poor sort of defender of the political faith of the party with which he is associated. As an exponent of conditions as they are to-day, let me ask if Mr. Jennings would be man enough to surrender the fat salary he is receiving for a position which neither nature or ability ever qualified him, and go back to the original days, with which he was so well acquainted before political fortune threw its mantle over him and numbered him with the elect. One might ask what Mr. Jennings knows of Green Bay generally though that district has had the misfortune to be represented by him for some years—but never again. The Government flesh pots appeal more to the cupidity of the present Minister of Public Works than the daily necessities of those whom he has the privilege to misrepresent. Family connections in public offices do not constitute all that is expected of a member of the House of Assembly and head of a department, even though the menu has changed from salt herring and spruce tea to broiled sole, etc.

Swedish Auto Tax Will Build Better Roads.

STOCKHOLM.—Swedish motorists will begin to pay taxes on their vehicles and tires on January 1, 1923. Tourists from foreign countries, however, may still bring their own cars into the country and roam about at will for as much as twelve months without any charge whatsoever. The new auto tax, which is to be applied to the repairing and improvements of roads in Sweden, is levied on cars and tires according to their weight. Each car using rubber tires is taxed a kroner for every hundred kilograms of fraction thereof, which amounts to about \$1 per hundred pounds. The tires are taxed 1.50 kroner for every kilogram of weight. Tires in use at the beginning of next year will be exempt, and in the case of pneumatic tires, two extras will be exempt.

English Women Advised to Smoke Pipes.

LONDON.—English physicians are urging women who are addicted to smoking, to use a pipe and good tobacco instead of the cigarette. The doctors point out that the nicotine found in the cheaper brands of cigarettes is much more injurious to women than to men, and they declare that the perfumes and scents used in brands prepared for the fair sex also are injurious. Two recent deaths of women have been attributed directly to cigarette smoking. While these cases have been due to excessive smoking, the physicians say that the same amount of pipe smoking probably would not have had fatal results. Smoking among women in London is now almost universal, and one rarely goes to a theatre, dance or restaurant where the majority of the women present are not smoking. Recently two

British Election Results.

Conservatives Have Clear Majority Over All Parties--Laborism Increases; Liberalism Declines--Georgian Party Wiped Out.

THE FIGHT IS OVER.

LONDON, Nov. 16.

The fiercest and most dramatic election since the Premier Lloyd George and Sir James Younger has for the time being won the chairmanship of the Conservative party. Younger and his supporters staked their political fortunes at the famous Carlton Club meeting which smashed the Coalition and set Lloyd George into the wilderness on the conviction that the Premier was ripe for return to straight politics and in the firm belief that the nation would send the Conservatives to the Commons with a clear majority. Their confidence has been amply justified and Wednesday's return of a Parliament with all the same predominance of Conservatives as the last Parliament elected in 1918 on a wave of grateful enthusiasm to Lloyd George as "the savior of the war." In the new Parliament Premier Bonar Law will command a majority over all parties combined of approximately eighty. While not so properly described as a landslide, as the Conservatives at the time of the dissolution of parliament claimed about 750, it amounts, considering the peculiar circumstances of the time and the high hopes held by Labor and Liberal parties of the day, to a country to progressive triumph. It may be supposed by the Conservatives themselves hardly expected such favorable results. It means a Parliament with little chance, except that Bonar Law replaces Lloyd George. The result of Lloyd George is the outstanding feature of the elections. The Liberal vote at the dissolution of parliament numbered 129 and in the new parliament will number 44. There will be 187 seats among the Premier's party that he failed to take the vote of some of his well-wishers before the time entirely from the political stage. The Asquithian vote rose from 24 in the old parliament to 62 in the new, but did not do so well as they expected. On the other hand although Labor failed to get the high hopes the party entertained at the dissolution it did exceed expectations well, rising from 76 to 135.

Generally, it is believed Labor would have done far better, but for its tactical mistake, in the advocacy of a capital levy. Perhaps the keynote of the election is the decline of Liberalism, and the growth of Labor, seems to show that henceforth the struggle will be between the Conservatives and Labor. Labor is now the second strongest party in the House. There are still ten seats to be heard from, the results of which will not be announced tonight.
