It may be news to a good many people that there is a strong Lodge of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks functioning in Newfoundland, or that there is such an Order in the British Empire. Although generally considered a purely American Order, the Canadian (or, since last year, the Canadian and Newfoundland) Order has been in existance for twelve years and has a large rapidly growing membership. Instituted in Vancouver in 1911, its activities were, until 1920, largely confined to the Pacific Coast and the Prairie Provinces. Since that date, however, the movement has been to a great extent in an Easterly direction, so that now flourishing Elks' Lodges may be found in most of the cities and larger towns in Eastern Canada. Montreal Lodge, with a membership of over a thousand, and headquarters in the Mount Royal Hotel, is the largest Lodge in the East, and one of the largest in the Dominion. It is estimated that the membership at the end of the present year will be not

less than 5,000 Grand Falls Lodge came into being over three years ago, in 1922 it became a part of the Canadian Orderwhich, in order to extend its scope so as to take in this country, changed incorporated title to read "Canada and Newfoundland." From a small beginning the Lodge has grown steadly until it now has a membership of about one hundred and a financial position that any organization might well envy. Plans are now being made for a very active season. It is expected that Lodges will be organized during he winter in St. John's, Bell Island, Corner Brook and probably one or two other centres, so that when the Grand Falls delegates leave for the Annual Convention at Calgary in August, they will be accompanied by the representatives of several other Newfoundland Lodges.
