way.—The increase of business daring the last few weeks on the Great Western Railway has been such that the road is crowded to its utmost extent in both the passenger and the freight departments. The rapid succession in which trains follow each other on the line is more remarkable than it has ever been known to be before in the history of the more remarkable than it has ever been known to be before in the history of the road. The receipts have consequently jumped up to a very high figure, and the resources of the management were never so severely tasked as at present, nor greater efforts made under adverse circumstances to satisfy the deminds of the public. The horse disease had an unfavourable effect of delaying the delivery of goods to merchants. When the epizootic was at its height, for days together there were no teams to carry away freight, which was thus allowed to accumulate; and, though the most strenuous efforts have been made by Hendrie & Co., the accumulation has never been entirely overcome.
