THE CHIPCRAZE CASE.—The special committee, to whom was referred the charge against Chief Constable Kelly—preferred by Constable Chipchraze—of procuring the discharge of a man arrested for infringement of the Lottery Act, finished taking evidence last night, and will report at next meeting of Council.  
SPLENDID WHEAT.—The Hamilton Times says:—At Messrs. J. A. Bruce & Co's, there is shown a sample of Five spring wheat and onions, grown by Mr. Kenneth Mackenzie, Burnside, Manitoba, (late of Pughlinch.) The wheat is a fine plump berry, weighing sixty-eight pounds to the bushel, and the onions, which measure seventeen inches in circumference, are only a fair average of his crop, of which he has between two and three hundred bushels. Mr. Mackenzie, who is now on a visit to Ontario, states that the root crops in Manitoba are immense, being far in advance of anything produced on his farm in Pughlinch.

**The Situation in France.**  
**Bad State of Affairs in New York.**

Paris, Nov. 27.—The resolution adopted by the minority of the Committee on the address in reply to M. Thiers' message proposing to the Assembly the nomination of a committee to present a bill establishing Ministerial responsibility, and embodying necessary constitutional reforms, fixes the number of members of said committee at 38, not 35 as stated yesterday.  
The New York Tribune tells us that three or four more murders are added to the glowing list of bloody crimes, Sunday's calendar furnishing the notable additions. The records show a black list of 138 cases of homicide in the city since January, 1870. Of these the death penalty stands against but one. Who wonders that murderers believe that hanging is "played out" in New York.  
Springfield, Mass., Nov. 27.—Michael Fahy, a brakeman, fell under the train to-day and was killed.  
An unknown passenger from Hiredall, in Gettysburg, jumped off the train at the same place. He fell under the wheels and was killed.  
Providence, R. I., Nov. 27.—Matthew Boyle, a labourer, was killed by the R. R. train near the depot this evening. He leaves a wife and five children.  
Baltimore, Nov. 27.—Conrad Weir, a German, committed suicide to-day. Jas. Merritt, for several years proof-reader on the Baltimore Gazette, also took poison and died from the effects. Both suicides caused by intemperance.  
Chicago, Nov. 27.—A despatch from Penitentiary, Mich., says "Echo Souvenir" went ashore last night near Ludington, and all hands lost. By the fall of a scaffold here to-day two men were killed.  
Boston, Nov. 27.—A slater named Wm. Brown, belonging to Portland, Me., fell from the roof of a building to-day, causing his death.  
The Relief Fund for the benefit of sufferers by the late fire now amounts to \$1,925.35.

## The Wellington, Grey & Bruce Railway.

**Opening of the Road to Southampton.**  
(From the Hamilton Times.)  
Tuesday was a gala day in Southampton, on the arrival of the train with W. K. Muir, Adam Brown, G. D. Ferguson, Jas. Watson, Wm. Hendrie and others, who had gone over the line by special train, previous to opening it the whole length for traffic, and who were greeted by thousands of villagers and people from the country surrounding.  
In the evening a grand banquet was given by the citizens, which took place at Bunby's Masonic Hotel. The chair was occupied by J. T. Conaway, Reeve, and M. Goldwell, Barrister, of Southampton. On the right of the chairman was W. K. Muir, General Superintendent, and Wm. Hendrie; on the left, Adam Brown and Col. Sprout.  
There were two hundred persons present, including the most prominent men of Southampton and surrounding townships. On the removal of the cloth the usual loyal and patriotic toasts were proposed.  
Then followed "The Vice-President and Directors of the Wellington, Grey & Bruce Railway," which was replied to by G. D. Ferguson, Vice-President of the Railway; Jas. Watson, J. M. Fraser, Alex. Sprout, and Adam Brown, the latter in a capital speech, which was frequently and loudly applauded. A telegram from Col. McGivern, President of the Company, was read, regretting that important business connected with the road had caused his absence. His health was drunk enthusiastically. The toast of the General Superintendent was replied to by Mr. Muir very appreciably. The toast of the Contractors was responded to by Mr. Hendrie in a first-rate speech. In his remarks he said that swamps couldn't stop the Wellington, Grey & Bruce Railway; fire was unable to impede their operations; and it was only water from Lake Huron that caused them to desist; next Monday the line would be open for traffic. Other toasts followed, and the proceedings closed about one o'clock.

## The Proposed new County of Dufferin.

(Continued.)  
A large and influential meeting was held at Donaldson's Corners, East Garafraxa, on the evening of the 21st inst., for the purpose of discussing the propriety of attaching the municipality of East Garafraxa to the proposed new County of Dufferin. The Rev. Mr. Henderson, being called to the chair, briefly stated the object of the meeting and expressed himself as favorable to the formation of the new county. He then called on Mr. Smith to make a few sensible and pointed remarks, referring to the separation of the Counties of York and Peel, and expressed his belief that our taxes would be greatly increased by the erection of new county buildings, and the support of a new set of county officials. Mr. Chisholm was next called on. He came forward with great reluctance. He said he thought his Orangeville friends should have spoken first. They should have given their reason for the change which they proposed to make, and then the ratepayers would know whether to support or oppose them. The County of Wellington was equalized at about thirteen millions, and the Township of East Garafraxa at about half a million, therefore, at the present time we pay one twenty-sixth of the expense of the County of Wellington, or say 4 dollars in support of a new set of county officials. ## Local and Other Items.

E. King Dodds, of sporting mania, threatens an evening paper on Toronto.  
There have been two fatal cases of small-pox in the eastern suburbs of London.  
St. Petersburg has thirty-four public schools; Vienna, forty-three; Berlin, sixty; and Madrid, fourteen.  
Typhoid fever is very prevalent in Toronto at present. A large percentage of the cases have proved fatal.  
Since 1849, Miss Rye has brought 800 children to this country, 600 of which have passed through the Home at Niagara.  
A joint excursion, early next summer, by a number of Canadian newspaper men of Quebec and Ontario, to Great Britain and the Continent, including the Vienna Exposition, is mooted.  
HOTEL AT LUCKNOW BURNED.—The "Farmers' Hotel," Joseph Alton, proprietor, caught fire from a defect in the chimney on Wednesday. The building and contents were a total loss. The building was insured to the amount of \$500 in the Waterloo Company.  
FIRE IN FLAMBORO.—The house and premises of Mr. D. Blain, East Flamboro, were totally destroyed by fire on Wednesday morning, the family barely escaped with their lives. A horse and some pigs were burned in the stable. The insurance was \$1,200, which will only partially cover the loss.  
THE HAMILTON INCEST CASE.—The man Bennett, who has been in Hamilton prison for some time, charged with incest, was on Wednesday brought up for examination on the third count of the charge, that of committing an outrage on a little girl named Sarah Downs. The prisoner pleaded not guilty, but the magistrates committed him for trial to the spring assizes.

## THE ITALIAN IMMIGRANTS.

The New York Sun says, "the chief difficulty with the three hundred Italian emigrants who are being subsisted on Ward's Island appears to be that they expected to get a living in New York without work. A pretty brief experience has shown them that Italy is a better country for that kind of business than America, and they are sorry they came. They complain that they were led to believe on the other side that the wages given here for unskilled labor were much higher than they really are. If such be the case, their ideas on the subject must have been exalted. If general sources of information are to be credited, the common pay for laborers in Italy is from 25 to 50 cents a day. A laborer must be a very lazy man who cannot earn a dollar and a half a day in New York, or fifteen dollars a month and board in the country. The Italians and other emigrants will have to learn that strangers cannot be supported here in luxurious laziness, and that every man is expected to hoe his own row.

## EVACUATION OF SAN JUAN BY THE BRITISH.


An despatch from Washington says the important intelligence has been received there that the joint military occupancy of the Island of San Juan by the United States and British forces was terminated on Friday by the withdrawal of the latter in accordance with the terms of the decision at Berlin under the treaty of Washington. It is highly creditable to the British Government that it acted with great promptness in this matter, having sent orders, without waiting for a request from the U. S. Government, to the Admiral in command of the British naval forces in that quarter to vacate the island without delay. Thus terminates, in the complete supremacy of the United States, a condition of affairs on this question which has been a matter of controversy for twenty-six years.

## Contractors for the Intercolonial Railway.

Contractors for the Intercolonial Railway state that there is no probability of through traffic being opened for at least two years from the present time.

## Mr. Stewart, of Orangeville, next came forward.

He said he had refused to speak before Mr. Chisholm because he was anxious to hear what arguments could be brought forward against a scheme so feasible and plausible as the formation of the new County. He understood from a leading supporter of the present Ontario Government that the larger counties will at an early day be divided on the principle of representation by population. Harrison, Arthur, Mount Forest, &c., were each about to apply for the formation of a new county. The question was not therefore separation or no separation from the County of Wellington, but simply will it not be better for the inhabitants of East Garafraxa voluntarily to join themselves to the proposed new County of Dufferin than to be thrown at random into some other County? Mr. Chisholm had not estimated the new County buildings too high, but his other arguments would not stand the test. Mr. Stewart then named a number of small Counties whose liabilities were much less than those of the County of Wellington. He therefore argued that small counties were more easily and economically managed than
