### ATHLETICS.

London Sportsman: On Saturday evening Louis Cyr, the champion heavyweight lifter of the world, made his first appearance at the Westminster Aquarium. Cyr's first feat consisted in holding out a 72-pound dumb-bell in the right hand at right angles, whilst hoisting three times in succession a 103-pound dumb-bell in the left. Cyr did this on his knees, a most surprising performance, for which he must have given every credit. Then with his two hands he hoisted a 263-pound bar-bell. This is distinctly a fine feat, and it is only fair to the Canadian to mention that the two weights were thoroughly tested. Finally the Canadian wound up by hoisting 2,400 pounds of living humanity on his back.

### BUILDINGS BURNED.

Big Blaze in Brooklyn—Loss Half a Million Dollars.

OTTAWA, Feb. 28.—About 1 o'clock this morning a fire broke out in the Brown block, Sparks street, occupied by a cigar vendor, Dancy; Uglow, stationer; McGiffin, gent's haberdasher; Kenner Bros., tailors; E. A. Selwyn, insurance agent; and Allan Ingalls, patent solicitor. The building was gutted. Loss about \$8,000; covered by insurance.

NEW YORK, Feb. 28.—Fire broke out this morning in the five-story brick building 425 to 431 Eleventh avenue, the city, and before the flames were extinguished the building was gutted and \$200,000 damage done.

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Feb. 28.—A disastrous fire occurred today in the clothing establishment of Smith & Gray, at the corner of Flatbush and Fulton avenues. It destroyed four houses, partially destroyed several others and caused a damage of over half a million dollars. Charles Shay and James Mallon, firemen, were badly hurt.

## The Winning Color!

Mr. J. B. McKillop. "Through-out the country," said he, "the Liberal press has given unstinted credit to the Liberal organization; but what would the result have been without a candidate like Mr. Hyman? (Cheers.) Five years ago when Mr. Carling was elected by a narrow majority of 39 we left him alone. Last year when we elected Mr. Hyman by a majority of 183 there were men so bitter in their hearts that they could not accept defeat like men. (Hear, hear.) Had it been a general election we would have been congratulating Mr. Hyman upon winning by 300 or 400. (Cheers.) You know how many working-men were deprived of their votes simply because they could not spare the time to come to the Court of Revision, and wait day after day to have their names put on the list. ("Shame! shame!") I am glad of the last remark made by Mr. Davis, that the thanks of Mr. Hyman and the Liberal press for the fine part it has taken in the contest, and for the splendid articles that have appeared in it. (Cheers.) I ask you, as reasonable men, to compare the Liberal press, the Liberal articles in the respective papers. Mr. J. D. Clarke came forward in response to persistent calls. He said: "I came out to-night in spite of the counsel of my medical adviser, because I was told that the procession would be the greatest popular demonstration ever witnessed in London, and I desired to see it for myself. I have not been disappointed. It speaks volumes for the popularity of the member for London and for the cause which he has espoused. (Cheers.) Some of the speakers have referred in kindly terms to the aid which the ADVERTISER has extended to Liberalism in London. I need scarcely tell you that the ADVERTISER is an independent journal, and that its stand for Mr. Hyman was dictated solely by the belief of its managers that the carrying out of the principles which he supports would be for the benefit of the great mass of the people of London and of the Dominion of Canada. It was nearly 10 o'clock when the member-elect came forward and proposed three cheers for the Queen, which were given with enthusiasm. Cheers were also given for Mr. Hyman, M.P., for Hon. Wilfrid Laurier and for the chairman, and the vast audience filed out to find the younger participants in the original procession still celebrating to the number of many hundreds.

### NOTES.

A SERIOUS ACCIDENT.

It is to be regretted that the auspicious affair did not pass off without a casualty. The most serious was that in which Mr. W. J. McKillop, late clerk of the Division Court, and formerly secretary-treasurer of the ADVERTISER, was the victim. He was standing in front of Strong's drug store when a misdirected or carelessly exploded sky-rocket struck him with terrific force in the face. He was picked up unconscious and carried into the drug store. Doctors who attended him found that his jaw-bone had been broken and that he had been dangerously injured elsewhere. He was badly burned, and the rocket stick had penetrated into his flesh five or six inches. At first it was thought the result would be fatal, but he is now doing well and there are bright expectations of recovery, which, his many friends hope, will be speedy.

THEY WERE BURNED.

Meers, A. G. Maurel and A. E. Franklin were in charge of the carriage containing pyrotechnic supplies. In front of the Old fellows' block, on Dundas street, the combustible material unfortunately became ignited and the occupants of the hack were subjected to an infernal fusillade of rockets and candles that made it decidedly "hot" for them. Mr. Maurel

was scorched around the face and hands, while Mr. Franklin, though he got off easier, is painfully burned. It is lucky the explosion had no more serious results. It created some consternation and excitement, but the procession was stopped only for a moment.

ALD. HANNAH HURT.

Ald. D. Hannah was asked by a recalcitrant horse near the corner of Wellington and Dundas streets. He was carried into Barkwell's drug store and medical assistance procured. His leg was injured by the force of the kick, but not as seriously as reported.

PROCESSION ECHOES.

It was rumored that a man wore a blue tie on the streets Saturday night. It was afterwards discovered he was a stranger.

"There's no place like home," remarked a good-humored Conservative as he made tracks that way when the procession appeared.

Mr. Thos. S. Hobbs, the energetic chairman of No. 3 ward, walked in the procession with two stalwart Liberals, Messrs. Geo. Burns and John Marshall. Mr. Hobbs was greeted along the route with the wildest cheering.

A stalwart colored voter on his way home from participating in the procession, still wearing the triumphant red ribbon, entered a store in the north end and asked: "Say, boss, got any oranges?" "Yes," replied the storekeeper. "Are they red?" demanded the purchaser, and all the clerks smiled.

Some enthusiastic Young Liberals draped Mr. Hyman's picture with red at the club rooms. The action was cheered.

The ladies seemed as enthusiastic as the men. What a rush there must have been for red ribbon, judging by the amount the fair sex displayed.

"Ah, I wish our young men could get up as much 'enthusiasm' as you girls," sighed a Conservative. "You haven't got the young men on your side, that's why," was the answer.

The Conservatives of this city are babies in comparison with the Liberal Association. ("The G. A. S. of this city have the best organization in the Dominion.") So said a prominent Conservative to a Reformer after the procession had gone by.

### AT THE CAPITAL.

The Liberal Leader's Health Improved.

Sir Richard Cartwright Ready to Criticize the Address from the Throne.

(Special to the ADVERTISER.)

OTTAWA, Feb. 28.—Mr. Laurier's condition is improved to-day, but it is doubtful if he will be able to attend the House to-morrow.

Sir Richard Cartwright arrived in the city to-day, and will criticize the speech of the day after to-morrow.

The usual drawing-room which the Governor General and Lady Stanley held at the opening of every session took place Saturday night. The attendance was twice as large as last year and larger than for several years. The reason for this was the invitation from his Excellency that the invitations for the Government House balls this winter would be made up on the night of the drawing-room.

Ottawa society had latterly begun to neglect these State functions until they became heavier and more wearisome than they need be, but the Governor's stand has been to make a proper appreciation of drawing rooms.

The French members of the House are almost all in Quebec, and will be till after the elections there.

C. E. B. (Laurier), who was re-elected in Digby, N. S., arrived yesterday. But as the certificate of his election was not received by Mr. Speaker from the clerk of the Crown in Chancery, to whom it should have been sent by the returning officer, he was not allowed to take his seat.

### IN LABOR'S FIELD.

Prospectus of a Colossal Strike in Staffordshire and Wales.

Coal Miners Oppose a Reduction of Wages—350,000 Men Affected.

The miners of North Staffordshire and North Wales have notified the masters that they will strike on March 12 to maintain their prices and wages. This action is in accordance with the decision of the recent miners' conference held at Manchester, and affects over 300,000 men. The Cleveland iron works in the north have threatened that the works will be closed if the miners strike.

The Duke of Westminster presided on Friday at the ceremony of opening a new labor home in London, established by the Church Army.

The strike of the weavers in the Canada Cotton Company's mill at Cornwall has ended, the demands of the men having been acceded to.

At Indianapolis on Saturday there were some rather riotous demonstrations in connection with the street railroad strike, but the casualties were limited to a few cracked heads and a slightly larger number of black eyes, while some of the cars were injured by being stoned and derailed.

The Garney strike works, Hamilton, have now 20 non-union men employed. The union men say the Garney works are paying the non-union men higher wages than the old union men received, in order to break up the union by defeating them in the present strike. The other four foundries in the city have been unable to

secure molders as yet, and their works are at a standstill.

### FOURTEEN LIVES LOST

By the Sinking of the Steamer Forest Queen.

The Vessel Cut in Two by a Coal—No Chance to Launch the Boats.

LONDON, Feb. 28.—Fourteen persons lost their lives by the sinking of the steamer Forest Queen, which was run down by the steamer Loughbrow off Lambrough yesterday.

Captain Lawson reports that it was 9:30 Wednesday night when the Loughbrow, which was loaded with coal, crashed into the Forest Queen's starboard quarter.

CUTTING HER IN TWO.

The Forest Queen immediately filled. Attempts were made to clear away the boats, but the steamer went down before davits could be swung out. Captain Lawson was carried down with the vessel. He says he felt her strike on the bottom and rebound. He got entangled in some of the rigging, and it was some time before he could free himself. After a most desperate struggle, however, he managed to disengage himself, and at once arose to the surface. He swam so some floating wreckage, on which he supported himself, and shouted for help. He was heard by those on the Loughbrow, which bore down on him. A rope was thrown to him, and he was hauled on board the steamer, after being for half an hour adrift. Two boats from the Loughbrow went around the spot where the Forest Queen had sunk until morning. They saw nothing of the others who were on board the ill-fated steamer.

The Loughbrow is seriously damaged. Owing to a heavy fog she lost her bearings and only arrived at Grimsby at noon Friday.

### POLITICAL POINTS.

Complete Returns from East Since—Mr. Savard Appeals to the Supreme Court—The Two Mountains Election.

Complete returns from Medora and Wood townships reduce Bennett's total majority to 38.

Mr. Savard, M. P. for Chicoutimi, who has been unseated by the trial judges, will appeal to the Supreme Court and thus retain his seat during the session.

There is not the slightest foundation for the report that Hon. W. Laurier has resigned or intends to resign the leadership of the Opposition.

Girouard, Conservative, was elected to the Federal House in Two Mountains by a majority of 453.

Mr. Hancock's council has decided to issue \$20,000 worth of bonds to supply the city with a sewerage system.

The brewers in the copper region have sent out circulars that no bills can be allowed to run longer than a month.

Grand Haven's public schools have been granted a permit to make a special exhibition in the educational line at the World's Fair.

The Catholics of Grand Rapids on Sunday dedicated a \$40,000 parochial school. It is one of the finest buildings in the city and fully paid for.

A Kingsley firm shipped five carloads of maple logs to Glasgow, Scotland, to be used in the manufacturing of rolls with which to stamp prints and other cloths.

Some of the largest buildings to be erected in Muskegon this summer will be put up by the Mackinac Foundry Company, structure being 300 feet long.

A couple of trappers at Hubbell Junction, Mackinac county, are said to have killed 70 deer this winter, besides several hundred other, martens and beavers.

The business committee of the State Agricultural Society, has appointed M. D. Stein, of Lansing, keeper of the fair grounds at a salary of \$300 and free house rent.

Burrows and Rust, lumber dealers of Bay City, have begun suit against the Delta Transportation Company to recover the loss by fire of \$50,000 worth of lumber, caused by the steamer Minnie M., belonging to the latter company.

The Grand Rapids Improvement Company intends to erect a mammoth building as headquarters for divers factories which have outgrown their present quarters, and do not desire to build themselves. It is thought that such a building would also attract a number of small outside concerns.

S. E. Davidson of Hull, Ia., and George J. Soney and other New York capitalists have purchased 20,000 acres of land near Sault Ste. Marie, and will colonize it with Germans and Scandinavians. They will clear 2,000 acres and build a dozen farm-houses next season. The land was bought of the Detroit and Marquette Railway Company.

In the report of the Department of Agriculture on the number and value of farm animals for January and February the following are the Michigan figures: Horses under 1 year old, \$22,022; between 1 and 2 years, \$52,282; between 2 and 3, \$73,073; over 3, \$98,311. The average value of Michigan milch cows is \$24.24; over 3 years average \$31.90; sheep under 1 year, \$2.69, and over, \$3.50.
