Proposed Amalgamation of Montreal Live Stock Shippers.

MONTREAL, Que., April 25.—An important deal is being put through here looking toward the amalgamation of the big live stock shippers of Montreal to control the trade of the Dominion. Messrs. John Crowe, Robt. Bickerdike, W. E. Bowell, L. Delayme, and Eraph, Luck hear spriight Crowe, Robt. Bickerdike, W. E. Bowell, L. Delorme and Frank Lynch have applied for a charter for "The Bickerdike and Crowe Cattle Company." It is understood a couple of larger western shippers and more of Montreal men, in all controlling 60,000 cattle, will compose the company. The idea is to combine and make the rates with the steamship companies, the same as is done in the States.

A syndicate of Montreal and New York capitalists, known as the Montreal Water Power Company, have commenced operations in Lachine Canal. The company will supply water to surrounding municipalities. The works will be completed about December, and will cost \$2,000,000.

The Dominien Line Steamship Company has ceased to carry the Canadian mails. Last winter the Allans took a contract with the Government for the mails for one year at £500 per round trip. They were to put on two out of five boats in winter and three out of six in summer. They divided this contract equally with the Dominion people. Lately the Allans proposed to allow the Dominion people only one boat. The latter company refused to go in unless they got two regular boats and have withdrawn from the service.
