The autumn meeting of the Housekeepers' Mission was held in the "Y" rooms, Dundas street, Monday afternoon. It is the distribution of canned fruits, vegetables and relishes to the different charitable institutions, and also to the sick and aged poor of the city. In order that the work may be sustained during the winter months a large supply of canned goods will be needed. In every case jars of equivalent capacity will be returned to the sender upon the receipt of goods. It is an easy matter for the busiest housewife to set aside a few jars from her winter stores for the benefit of the needy. Yet simple and easy as this charity is there is none so much appreciated by the suffering poor of the city.

The balance was to be paid in quarterly payments of \$25 each. Last December Mr. Parsons went to Cincinnati, Ohio. On July 9 Wm. Seccombe, brother-in-law of Mr. Parsons, had the piano shipped per G. T. R. to parts unknown. Seccombe stated that the instrument was shipped early in June to Port Huron but was not sure to whom it was addressed. Fraser & Fraser, solicitors for the Bank of British North America, waited on Mrs. Parsons, and she oftered them \$100 to settle the payment. There was at the time \$136 due. She would not say where the piano was when questioned. A bailiff was then engaged to search for the instrument and he reported that it was not in the house. The Bank of British North America of Toronto had placed the claim in the hands of their solicitor. The Grand Trunk authorities stated that on

claim in the hands of their solicitor. The Grand Trunk authorities stated that on July 9 a piano was shipped to A. L. Holmes, Detroit, and that no other piano had been shipped for some weeks previous to this time, in fact since May. E. Meredith, counsel for the defendant, went into the box on behalf of his client. He said he advised Mrs. Parsons that she had a right to ship the piano wherever she wished, and that she did it on his advice. He thought it was a most scandalous proceeding, and the prosecution was entirely unjustified and harsh. The magistrate, after considering the evidence, dismissed the case.

THE CITY MORTALITY Interesting Statements Gleaned from

the Statistical Returns.

London is a comparatively healthy city. Its death rate per 1,000 of population is 11.59, a proportion creditably lower than that of other large cities of Canada. According to the returns 359 people died in London during 1890. The classified tables show that of these 162 were males, 197 females, and 152 widowed; 178 were English, 104 Irish, 56 Scotch, 2 French, and 19 of other nationalities; 112 were Church of England, 113 Methodists, 58 Roman

19 of other nationalities; 112 were Church of England, 113 Methodists, 58 Roman Catholics, 19 Baptiats, and 2 of denominations undefined.

Statistics inform us that of this number 76 died under 1 year of age, 22 from 1 to 5 years, 17 from 5 to 15, 31 from 15 to 25, 28 from 25 to 35, 23 from 35 to 45, 26 from 45 to 55, 46 from 55 to 65, 41 from 65 to 75, and 49 who were over 75 years of age. Their occupations were also classified as follows: 111 industrial, 120 laborers, 69 commercial, 9 domestic, 24 professional and 26 in other pursuits. This evidence speaks strongly for the advantages of domestic strongly for the advantages of domesti

The compiler has also prepared a table of the diseases in the order of ratality. Among the foremost are: Lung diseases 47, phthisis 37, old age 35, heart and blood putnisis 31, old age 35, heart and blood vessel diseases 25, cerebro spinal affections 19, catarrhal affections 18, diarrheal affections 17, paralysis 16, enteritis and other affections of the bowels 15, cancer 13, epilepsy and convulsions 12. As regards the contagious diseases, scarlet fever claims 6 victims, typhus 6 and diphtheria 5. The greatest mortality in any one month was in January, the rate being 2.05 pe

Deaths by accidents aggregate 16.71 to 1,000 deaths, and .19 to 1,000 population. In the latter respect London's proportion is remarkably low compared with other cities, Quebec, the next in order, showing .46.
