Thrilling Account of Mr. Essery's Onslaught on the Foresters.

He Calls Members of the Order "Pups of Jersey," and Threatens an Entire Court.

Then Takes the Brathren to Law and Sticks Them for Costs, Which He Refuses to Pay.

"I have always been a Conservative, and am employed by a Conservative," said a leading member of the Ancient Order of Foresters to a reporter today, "but neither I nor my employer will vote for Mr. Essery. My chief ground against him is that he took advantage of and scandalized our order by compelling our members-many of them workingmen like myself-to go to court and defend themselves, and then refused to pay them their costs after two courts of law had decreed that it was common justice he should do so.

"Let me tell you the exact facts regarding the outrageous conduct for which Mr. Essery was forever expelled from the order. Mr. Essery had managed to reach the chief ranger's chair in Court Pride of the Dominion, and on the evening in question we were proceeding with the usual report of the arbitration committee. A motion was made in the regular way, but Mr. Essery's temper was unusually short that night, and it happened that the brother who made the motion was disliked by him. Mr. Essery refused to accept the motion, and on being remonstrated with by the mover and seconder he exclaimed, 'I will not be dictated to by pups from Jersey,' referring to the portion of England from which the brethren mentioned came. Naturally, the court was soon in an uproar. The language used was such as we had never heard in a court before, and there was not a brother present who was prepared to tolerate it. Several of the brethren jumped to their feet, and demanded that Mr. Essery should leave the chair, or obey the rules of the order. One well-posted brother read the bylaw that he had flagrantly broken, Mr. Essery then seized a chair, and exclaimed: 'The first man that comes near me I will brain him !' No sooner had he done so than two of the officers threw off their coats, seized the battle-axes, and stood guard in front of the infuriated man, prepared to defend the court against friend of the workingmen. It was clearly proved that Mr. Essery had no warrant to take his fellow Forester into a court of law, and he was condemned to pay Bro. Moore's costs. I saw Bro. Moore the other day, and he told me that Mr. Essery has so far not paid a cent of the costs, though it is years since he became liable for them.

"At the close of this trial Mr. Essery was summoned before Court Pride of the Dominion on a charge of having taken a brother into a court of law in connection with business that occurred in the court, and in clear violation of the Foresters' laws. The court unanimously sustained the charge, and Mr. Essery was expelled for all time to come from the order. The district meeting at Point Edward decided that Mr. Essery should have a more extended trial if he would pay up all his back dues. This motion was moved by Bro. J. S. Dewar as a fair one towards all parties. But Mr. Essery contemptuously refused to recognize the proceedings, and once more resorted to the law courts. He dragged his brethren into the Court of Chancery before Judge Proudfoot, who decided that he had not a leg to stand upon, and condemned him to pay all costs. Mr. Essery then decided he did not have enough of law. He again dragged the members of the court before the Appeal Court at Toronto, and there, too, it was decided by Chancellor Boyd and Mr. Justice Ferguson that he had acted illegally and that he had no case against his brethren. Again he was con-

demned to pay all costs. "This took place years ago. But up till the last meeting of the court Mr. Essery had not paid one cent of the \$382 he illegally compelled his brethren to spend in defense of the interests of their order. Do you blame me or any other selfrespecting Forester, no matter what his politics have hitherto been, for voting against a man who exhibited so little wisdom or fair play as that? My British blood boils every time I think of his assurance in asking for our votes while he is our debtor and has never apologized to us for the grave wrong he did us."
