In the Dining-Room.

TUESDAY, APRIL 27.
★ **BREAKFAST**—Oranges. Oatmeal with sugar and whipped cream. Dutch fried potatoes. Boiled eggs. Popovers with butter and maple syrup. Coffee.
★ **LUNCHEON**—Boudins. Lettuce. Whole wheat bread and butter. Swedish rolls. Pieplant sauce. Tea.
★ **DINNER**—Clear soup. Very small squares of hot dry toast. Small roast, mashed potatoes. Spinach. Imperial rice. Tea.

Cut these recipes out and past them in a scrapbook.

Dutch Fried Potatoes—Fry a teaspoonful of chopped onion in pork fat or butter, add two cupsful sliced raw potatoes, one-half teaspoonful of salt, one-quarter teaspoonful pepper, and fry a delicate brown. Beat an egg light, pour over the potato and take up at once in a hot dish.

Boudins—Two cups finely chopped cold cooked veal, chicken or whitefish; one-half cup chopped oysters, a sprig of parsley, one-quarter of a teaspoonful salt, a saltspoon white pepper, two stalks chopped celery, one-half cup white sauce, the beaten whites of two eggs stirred in the last thing. Half fill small buttered cups with the mixture, set in a baking tin of hot water, bake fifteen or twenty minutes; turn out on a hot platter and pour over the boudins a cupful of white sauce.

Swedish Rolls—One-half cake of compressed yeast, one pint scalded milk, six cups of good flour, whites of two eggs, one-quarter cup sugar, one tablespoon butter, one cup currants, one tablespoonful grated yellow part of lemon peel. Stir three cups of flour into the milk when it becomes lukewarm. Add the sugar, a small teaspoon of salt, the butter and the well-beaten whites of the eggs and the yeast dissolved in a warm place to rise. When fully twice its size add the rest of the flour, rub butter over the dough and let rise in a warm place an hour or until double the size. Take a part of the dough on a slightly floured board, pat it out to less than half an inch in thickness, butter with soft butter, sprinkle thickly with sugar, then with a little of the lemon and lastly with currants. Roll as for a jelly roll. Cut off slices half an inch thick, put in a buttered tin, let rise an hour and bake in a quick oven twenty minutes. To be eaten cold.

Note—The remainder of the Swedish roll dough may be made into cinnamon rolls by substituting cinnamon for the grated lemon peel or into any other preferred rolls.
Imperial Rice—Put in a double boiler put one and one-half cups milk, one-half saltspoon of salt, one-quarter cup rice. Cook till the milk is absorbed, then add one-sixth box of gelatine soaked in the cold water and dissolved over heat. When the mixture is cold and preparing to thicken add one-quarter cup of powdered sugar, one-half teaspoonful vanilla, and lastly half a cup of cream whipped to a stiff froth. Turn in a wet mold and set away to cool.

—Mr. Archibald Campbell, M.P., came up from Ottawa on Saturday to attend the funeral of his nephew, the late Mr. Burnett Sinclair, druggist, Woodstock. —The East Middlesex license commissioners on Saturday received applications for licenses from the 21 holders of licenses at present and one new application, that of Peter Young, of Nisour. Decision was reserved on the latter, and also on those of Alonzo Hall, of Lambeth, and Joseph Goulding, of London township, and all the others were granted. There was no delegation of temperance people present at the meeting on Saturday, contrary to the custom of several years.

—Yesterday, the first Sunday after Easter, also known as Low Sunday, from the inferiority of its services to those of the preceding Sunday, happens also to be St. Mark's Day. In pre-Reformation times, April 25 was known in England as Black Cross Day, because the crosses and poles carried in procession were draped in black. St. George's Society and Sons of England Attend Divine Service.

The annual church parade of St. George's Society took place yesterday afternoon from their rooms in the Albion block, to St. George's Church, London West. They were accompanied by large numbers of the Sons of England, including representatives of the seven lodges in the city: British Oak, Kensington, Chelsea, Piccadilly, Beresford, Trafalgar and British Lion. The grand marshal, Bro. Arthur Wasp, was assisted by the deputy marshals of the various lodges, and at 2:45 the procession was ready to move. In the places of honor were President B. J. Nash, of St. George's Society, and Sergeant A. T. Cooper, district deputy, Sons of England. The Seventh Battalion Band, under Bandmaster Freshair, headed the column, and played several selections of sacred music with fine effect. The corner of Dundas and Richmond streets was crowded with onlookers, and so indeed were the streets all along the route, which was across the city and down the river to the church, returning by Oxford and Richmond streets.

The sky was clear as the parade took place, but the morning's rain made the roads muddy, and this was responsible for a smaller turnout than there would otherwise have been. At the church, the rector, Rev. G. B. Sage, delivered an appropriate sermon, and Ven. Archdeacon Marsh assisted in conducting the service. Mrs. Smith presided at the organ.

DID HE STEAL IT?
