



Diane de Poictiers was 36 when she won the heart of Henry II. The King was half her age, but his devotion never changed. Anne of Austria was 38 when described as the most beautiful woman in Europe. Mme. De Maintenon was 43 when united to Louis, and

Catherine of Russia was 33 when she seized the throne she occupied for 35 Mile. Mar was most beautiful at 45, and Mme. Recamier between the ages of 35 and 55. The most lasting and passion is not inspired by twodecade beauties. The old saw about weet sixteen is exploded by the truer knowledge that the highest beauty does not dwell in immaturity. For beauty does not mean alone the fashion of form and coloring as found in the waxen doll. The dew of youth and a complexion of roses are admirable that period, but a woman's best and richest years are from 36 to 40. It is an arrant error for any woman to regard herself as passe at any age,
