Cabinets Collapse

The peace treaty unanimously, public excitement on the subject having quite subsided.

Madrid, Sept. 29.—The Spanish Cabinet has resigned. The ministry was constituted as follows: Prime minister and minister for war, Gen. Marcelino Azcaraga; minister for foreign affairs, the Duke of Tetuan; minister of marine, Rear Admiral Don Jose M. Beranger; minister of finance, Don Juan Navarro Reverter; minister of commerce and agriculture, Don Aureliano Linares Rivas; minister for the colonies, Don Cos-Gayon; minister for the home department, Don Fernando Cos-Gayon. The queen has accepted the cabinet's resignation, but has asked Gen. Azcaraga to continue in office until a solution of the crisis is found.

It is said that Senor Sagasta is in favor of superseding Captain-General Zelaya and of granting autonomy to Cuba immediately. Senor Gamazo was probably the minister of foreign affairs in the new cabinet.

London, Sept. 30.—A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Madrid says: The solution of the crisis depends upon the policy to be adopted towards the United States. Liberal politicians declare that they will stoutly resist American pretensions. Gen. Azcaraga, however, interviewed the queen regent and explained the situation. It is believed that he asked her majesty if she was ready to confirm the government in necessary powers, in view of the attitude of the United States. After the interview he summoned the cabinet, which was attended by Senor Reverter, the excommunicated minister of finance, and Senor Cos-Gayon, minister of the interior, both of whom tendered their resignations. Shortly afterward the premier tendered the resignation of the entire cabinet.

The shipments of cattle this season from Manitoba and the Territories will be the heaviest in the history of the Northwest. The number already shipped is far ahead of last year's total, and one firm has still between 17,000 and 18,000 head to forward. Many of the western ranchers are contracting for the supply of cars next month.

The death of James Allen, the well-known aeronaut, has just been announced from his home near South Providence, R. I. Mr. Allen, who was 72 years old, began his ballooning in 1854, and during the war made fully 1,500 ascensions and observations for the Union army. In 1885 he went to Brazil, where he entered the service of Dom Pedro in the war against Paraguay. Allen left four sons, each of whom is a skilled balloonist.

Wheat prices declined two to five cents throughout Manitoba. Deliveries for the day were 210,000 bushels.

The Olive mine, near Mine Center, has been sold by Winnipeg parties to an English syndicate for \$350,000.

The assessment of St. Catharines shows a gain of \$275,000 in property and 250 in population over last year.

The sealing schooner Casco, just returned to the Victoria wharf, has been on a cruise off the Japan coast, Coffee Islands and the Komandorski Island, bringing news that seals are very scarce and scattered.

Scored a Point.

Defense Boiled Two Bodies in the Lutegert Vat.

Ex-Judge Vincent Declares Result Shows That the Prisoner Was Making Soap.

Chicago, Sept. 30.—The most important point scored on Tuesday by the defense in the Lutegert trial was the evidence of Dr. B. L. Riese, who boiled two bodies in caustic potash in the vat in Lutegert's sausage factory and obtained results different from those who boiled bodies in caustic potash in behalf of the state.

Dr. Riese made one experiment in the vat in which the body of Mrs. Lutegert is alleged to have been destroyed, with the body of a woman 5 feet 2 inches high, weighing 200 pounds. Very little flesh was left on the body. The color of the liquid in the vat resembled vinegar. On the surface of the body was a fatty substance, the twentieth part of an inch deep. The skull, femurs and the large bones remained nearly intact. The hair almost entirely disappeared.

The second experiment was much the same, with the exception that the vat was very hot. The effect of this testimony which in fact bore out to a considerable degree the claims of the defense, was to establish one important point: the defense has kept in view from the beginning the fact that the body of Mrs. Lutegert was made in the vat.

Dr. Riese testified that the residue from both of the bodies boiled in the vat was very little. In fact, he did not amount to over a twentieth part of an inch. The physician said, Ex-Judge Vincent declared this statement substantiated the story of the defense that Lutegert was making soap in the vat, and that the grease in the soap boiled over and flowed on the floor.

THE FAMOUS LIBEL SUIT.

Mr. Whealan Confirms Hon. Mr. Tarte's Evidence as to the \$50,000 Donation to the Conservative Election Fund.

Montreal, Sept. 30.—The Tarte-Greene case was continued yesterday in a hunt for evidence against Mr. Tarte by the defense, but Judge Wurtelle disallowed many of the questions, and the case was adjourned until Friday.

On the other hand, the testimony allowed told in Mr. Tarte's favor, particularly in the afternoon, when Mr. Whealan corroborated his story about that \$50,000 transaction. Mr. Whealan said when he corroborated Mr. Tarte's story about the \$50,000 donation to the Conservative election fund, he expressed regret that he had not obtained the whole of the \$50,000 which he had paid out. Mr. Whealan repeated forbidden questions so often in different forms that the judge had to remonstrate.

Mr. St. Pierre remarked that once he narrowly escaped being sent to jail by Judge Ramsey for repeating a disallowed question, and the judge added: "I have more patience than Judge Ramsey."

SEEDING DELAYED.

Central States Farmers Hampered by Dry Weather.

Washington, Sept. 30.—The weekly crop bulletin of the agricultural department says: Except on the Atlantic coast, where rains have fallen, the week has been exceptionally dry, and upon the whole very favorable for maturing crops and gathering in. Like the preceding weeks, however, it has been very unfavorable for germination of sown grain, as well as for fallowing and seeding, which is much delayed generally throughout the central and western and in some of the southern states. In Nebraska, however, a large acreage of wheat has been sown, much of which is up and doing nicely.

In the Atlantic coast states the conditions have been more favorable for fall seeding and satisfactory progress has been made. The frosts of the early part of the week proved injurious to late corn in portions of Ohio, Kentucky, Pennsylvania and New York, but farther west no serious injury is reported, and in some states cutting is nearing completion.

In Tennessee, Kentucky, Ohio and Virginia, late tobacco has been seriously injured by frosts.
