It admits that "no one excels him in oratory, uniting the finish, persuasion and grace of literature, with the suppleness and force of the spoken address," and that by his choice of a subject, "Questions of Empire," he reminds us all that he keeps in touch, intellectually at least, with the gravest matters of public concern. But this Scotch journal then goes on to deal at considerable length with the statements of the noble lord. This certainly expresses a feeling that is very widespread, a plan, and in order to obtain as high a feeling of disappointment that a man of Lord Rosebery's gifts, graces and position is not doing more practical work for the empire of which he speaks so brilliantly. The Scotch journal further finds the statement of imperial-Jam somewhat narrow, and wants to know if, as the noble lord said, "Do we not hail in this (the growth of the empire) less the energy and fortune of a race than the supreme direction of the Almighty?" how it is that his great dream of a united empire of Britain and America was not accomplished. There is, according to this writer, a possibility of forgetting the larger life of humanity and the fundamental part played by other great nations. This is what Mr. Kruger did with such fatal results.

The criticism is a piece of good writing and careful reasoning. It shows us that in the land where Lord Rosehery is so well known and admired. men look upon his political life as not being what it might have been. It may be a good way of spending his time to write the life of Napoleon, and to prepare brilliant academic addresses, but there is other work which he might do and which others with equal literary gifts cannot do as well. Let us hope that he will yet devote himself more fully to statesmanship and apply the lessons he has learned from history to the politics of his own

The Medical School.

"Man raises, but time weighs," is a Greek proverb, and the large numbers of students and graduates who attended the medical dinner at the Tecumseh House the other evening must have been well pleased with the progress of the school up to the present time. It is not long since a few of the leading doctors of London established the Medical School. They gave their time and money not knowing whether the school could be made a success or not, but it has long since passed the doubtful stage, and is now recognized to be as efficient a school

as any in Canada. The advantage to the city as well as to the medical profession is very great. The medical men become more perfect in their profession, and the people reap the benefit. It has made London a medical center, and brought the medical men of London to the notice of the whole province, and at the present time there is no class of operation performed in Toronto that

vestigated by the United States Agricultural Department, and it is found that in the New England States so great is the evil arising from the radical changes in lumbering methods will be necessary before any betterment can be hoped for. The lumbermen cut the logs on the stumpage scale as possibile, cut the tree high up on the trunk and low on the top, leaving almost half the top in the woods. This is not only wasted, but the fungi spores spread from the dead trunks and limbs to standing trees which might otherwise remain sound, and in-

sects similarly spread about. As trees grow older the chances of attack from fungi and insects are increased. In the Maine forests, particularly in the Rangely Lake region, trees have reached an age where it appears that the rate of annual secretion, and consequently the annual increase in value is very small, while the danger of infection is increasing every year. Such trees, the report of the United States Department of Agriculture recommends, should be cut immedately where practicable. The principle should be established that it will prove more profitable in the long run to cut trees after they have reached a certain age to prevent depreciation due to the attack of fungi or insects. Future investigation will have to determine what the exact age is at which

Several fungi attack trees after they have been killed by insects or other agents. This is of great practical significance, for it may often be possible to harvest such dead trees before the fungus in question has had time to begin work. Emphasis is laid on the statement that a dead tree is as valuable as a live tree, provided its wood is sound, and it ought to be cut immediately. Large forests in Maine have been made worthless by failure to cut immediately, when killed by bark beetles or other insects, or blown down by strong winds. Of the fungi found growing on the wood of the coniferous trees only a small number bring about changes which completely destroy the wood. All the fungi described in the report belong to the polyporei. Their sporophores form in the summer, discharge their spores into the air in great numbers, and these are carried to great distances by They germinate under


