Woman Attempts Suicide in

Parisian Theater. Paris, March 21. - At the close of Sarah Bernhardt's performance in

"Werther," at her theater following a dramatic climax, when Werther seeks to kill himself, the audience was startled by a woman's voice in the body of theater, crying, "I, too, wish to die." This was followed by a pistol shot. It proved to be an attempt at suicide by Madame Paule de Martigny, a well-known newspaper contributor. She was accompanied by her daughter, knowing her mother's intent, had withdrawn the ball cartridges from the pistol and replaced them with blanks, so that the shot did not damage beyond causing a temporary panic. she had concealed in her handkerchief. She was taken to a hospital and has recovered. Today's developments indicate that the attempt at suicide was due to destitution.
